against the treasury of the United States."

Few will debate with Congressman Pierce the necessity for cheap chemicals and cheap fertilizers to aid Western farmers. His exposition of this need before the house is unshakable. But many will challenge the wisdom of plunging the federal government into the manufacturing and selling business in direct competition with private industry, particularly at a time when the administration is attempting to assist business rather than to restrict it.

Only after private industry has demonstrated its unwillingness or its inability to combine cheap Bonneville power with raw materials in the Pacific Northwest should the public compete.—Oregon Journal.
