
### Structure Progresses

#### UNEMPLOYMENT IN STATE DECREASES

Oregon's "back to work" movement jolted the placement barometer up 43 per cent during March and 70 per cent of the 4173 regular placements were in private industry, the state unemployment compensation commission announced. following compilation of the monthly reports from the state's 22 local employment offices.

Agriculture provided 18 per cent of the new jobs, an increase in the state total of 11 per cent. Lumber manufacturing noted a 7 per cent jump to 23 per cent of the state total. Personal services rated about the same but public construction dropped from 36 per cent of the total to 28 per cent, although still leading the field in actual numbers.

Hood River, covering Hood River county, accounted for 160, or 3.8 percent, of the state total,

Newport, Salem, Klamath Falls and Astoria registered the largest increases. The Portland figure dropped from 30 per cent of the state total tot 19 per cent.

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
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
