Conference Will Discuss Power

Power developments in the northwest, their relation to northwest economy and their place in the national administration's power policy will receive thorough treatment at the fifth Pacific Northwest regional planning conference in Seattle, April 27, 28 and 29.

Acting Bonneville Administrator Charles E. Carey, Joel David Wolfsohn of the national power policy committee, and F. A. Banks, construction engineer for the reclamation bureau at Grand Coulee will be among the speakers on power subjects.

Theme of the conference, under the leadership of George F. Yantis, chairman of the Pacific Northwest regional planning conference, will be "migration and the development of economic opportunities in the Pacific northwest." The meetings will be held at the Olympic hotel.

Carey will be the first speaker on power as it affects the northwest's general economics section when he and Walter W. R. May of Portland General Electric Company address the conference at 10:40 a. m. on April 28. C. E. Magnuson of the University of Washington and Homer H. Grant of the Washington state department of public service will lead the discussion.

Carey and Banks will address the Friday afternoon session on the regional significance of the Bonneville and Grand Coulee projects. Their talks will be followed by an open discussion.

Wolfsohn, Governor Clarence D. Martin and Charles C. Colby of the national resources committee will be speakers at a banquet which will close the program Saturday evening, April 29.

Industries To Hear Power Facts

Leading engineers and executives of the nation's electrochemical industries will be told next Saturday of the rich opportunities in their field to be found in the Pacific northwest through the use of Bonneville power.

Ivan Bloch, head of the Bonneville Project's market development section, will leave Portland Tuesday for Columbus, Ohio, where he has been invited to address the seventy-fifth meeting of the Electrochemical Society, Inc., on "Power and the Development of the Pacific Northwest."

Bloch has prepared a number of maps, slides and tables showing the growth of northwest population, the need for basic and secondary industry, extent of low-grade ore deposits and the availability of low-cost Columbia River power which will permit the processing of the ore at a profit.

Bloch will use material which he has been preparing for months under the supervision of the late Bonneville Administrator, J. D. Ross, for the purpose of giving information on the industrial possibilities of Bonneville to the industries most vitally concerned.

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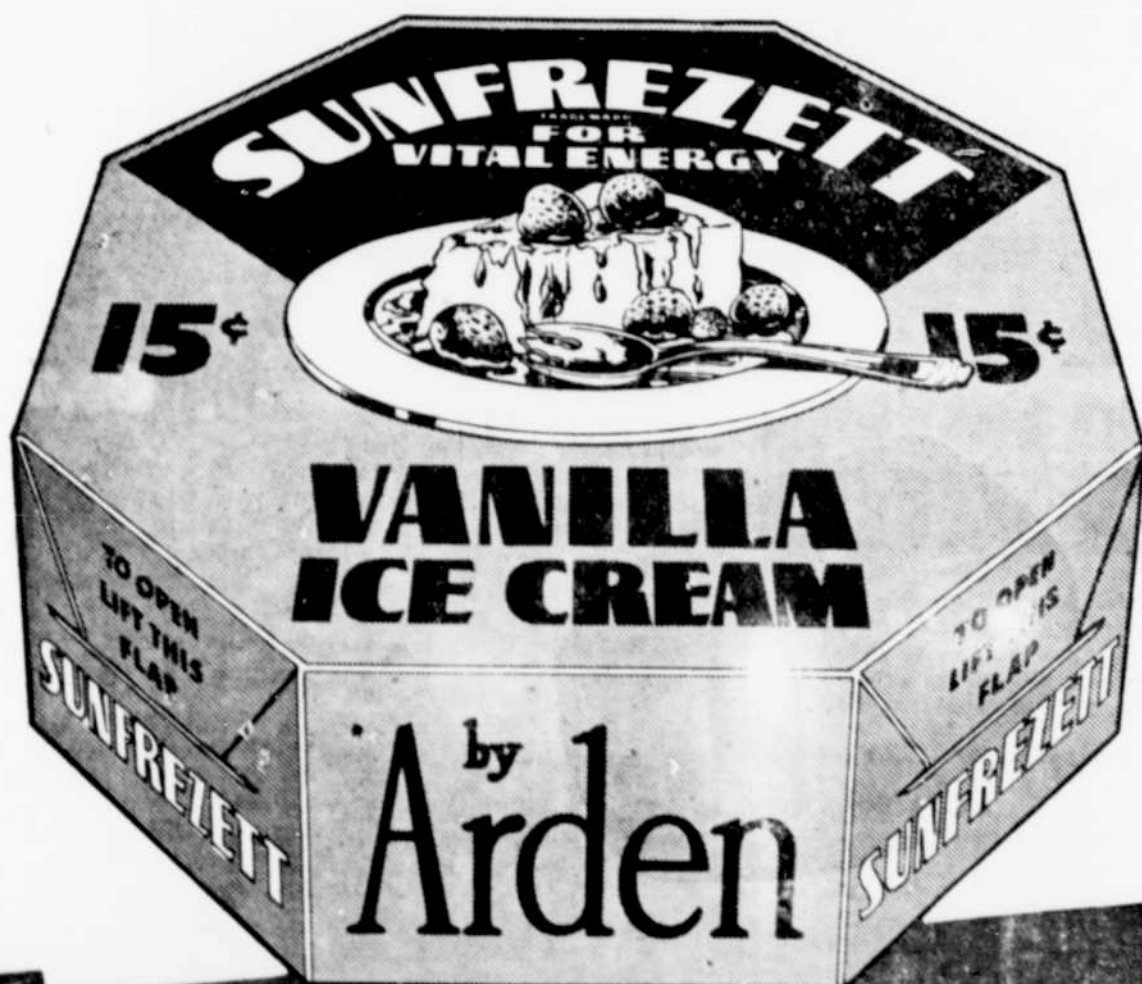
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
