the work and grief of the office
of Bonneville Administrator.

TO REQUIRE FIRE PERMITS AFTER MAY 15

Permits will be required after
May 15 for the burning of any class
of debris, Roy Weeman, District
Ranger of the Mt. Hood National
Forest, announced this week. This
regulation will be in force until
the first of the year, and applies
anywhere in the state within one-
eights of a mile of forest material.
Permits on camp fires, which do

not come under the heading of
burning debris, will be required
after July 1.
