ties created by the Bonneville Project will permit the reduction and processing not only of northwestern ores, but of foreign ores such as shipped in from Alaska, Bolivia and the Malay states.

### Wood Industries Stressed

Bloch directed attention to the opportunities for chemical and wood-products industries which could utilize Northwest resources and cheap Bonneville power. Among the electrolytic products are sodium chlorate, and a variety of acids and alkalis utilizing hydrogen, oxygen and nitrogen extracted from water and air. Chlorine and caustic soda can be made from electrolysis of brine.

A long list of other products feasible for Northwest manufacture include liquid and dry silicate cements, glass products, dry ice, sulphuric acid, calcium carbide and its derivatives, linseed oil products, and distilled beverages. Almost unlimited in scope, he said, is a fertilizer industry that would open up Idaho's vast phosphate deposits by the use of cheap hydro-electric power.

Eastern Washington and western Idaho contain large deposits of fine siliceous residual kaolins or china clays, Bloch said. By the use of electric power these clays can be dewatered and their constituents separated and dried in standard clay washeries. They can also be used in the manufacture of refractories, porcelain, tiles, pottery, and sanitary ware through processing in kilns and furnaces, some of which can be electrically heated.
