The following editorial appeared in yesterday's Oregonian. Its thought provoking presentation is worthy of passing it on to our readers.

"Within the last few days Secretary of the Interior Ickes found no trouble in obtaining the dismissal of R. W. Beck, principal electrical engineer of the Bonneville project. The secretary has the appointment of the administrator; to the administrator had been left the selection of his office personnel. Mr. Ickes demand the discharge of Beck. The acting administrator naturally complied.

"Mr. Beck had released for publication an unsent letter written by the late J. D. Ross pertaining to administrative policies. Mr. Ickes reprimanded Beck on the ground that he had exceeded his authority. Mr. Beck replied by wire apologizing for having disturbed the secretary, but ventured to defend his act, and then ended by pledging his full and hearty co-operation.

"Mr. Beck made a mistake in defending what he had done. He had politely told the secretary of the interior that he thought the secretary was wrong. Now that in Mr. Ickes' department is "defiance and threats." And although Mr. Beck's telegram was not made public at the time and never would have been in ordinary circumstances, it called for Mr. Beck's official head.

"It is now proposed in a bill introduced by Senator McNary that Mr. Ickes be clothed with the direct appointive power over certain subordinates in the Bonneville administration.

"Well's that ought to provide the secretary with Bonneville subordinates who have no imagination, no initiative and are yes-men first, last and all the time. Whether Bonneville can be successfully administered at a distance of 3000 miles by one who will not stand for apologetic question of his views on what ought to be done in comparatively minor particulars is a quite important question."
