Plans Laid for Swimming School

Preparations for the fifth annual Hood River County Swimming School were made at the annual meeting of the officers, instructors, representatives and bus drivers, held at the Chamber of Commerce Thursday evening.

Officers for the coming year were re-elected, R. E. Steele being again chosen president; Charles T. Howe, vice-president; Prince Koberg, Secretary, and J. L. Breckenridge, Treasurer.

The budget for the coming year will remain practically the same as last, \$1141 being adopted as the sum required for maintaining the school. It was announced by County School Superintendent L. B. Gibson that the county unit had increased its allotment this year to \$150 and the matter of establishing classes in Cascade Locks was given study, toward which the increased sum might be applied. A swimming place for a school in that community was the problem faced by the officers. Weeman Bay was suggested as one possibility.

Most of the budget will be used for transportation, school bus drivers having again agreed to transport the children from the Valley to Koberg Beach on swim days. A sum of seven dollars per day is allowed the busses, while swimming instructors are paid on a basis of \$17.50 per week for the senior instructors and \$12.50 for assistants.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the Columbia River water is safer for swimmers than the average pool. There has never been a case of typhoid fever in the history of the community which was traced to swimming in the Columbia, it was reported. One official expressed the idea that the river water was safer as far as contamination is concerned than the average natatorium.

Bathhouses are disinfected daily, John Koberg, proprietor of the beach announced.

Tentative dates for the swimming school were set for July 10 to August 26.

The matter of allowing school credit for the swimming school was discussed. Arrangements will be made, it was decided, to give grade school children special marks on report cards for attendance at the school. For those past the Ninth grade, credit will not be

given just for learning to swim, but special requirement will have to be met.

First Cherries Received

The first cherries to be received in Hood River for the 1939 season were unloaded and packed at the Columbia Packing plant Monday. The Bing cherries were from the orchard of the George L. Aggers estate near White Salmon. Cherries from orchards in the Lower Valley were not expected to be received in any great quantities until next week. They were shipped east yesterday.

A small crew was working at the Columbia Plant during last week at box-making. Pear and apple boxes have been produced at the rate of 4900 per day and cherry lugs at 1500 per day. This, however, is by no means the capacity of the plant.

One box-making machine there can produce 2400 boxes per day and another has a capacity of 2000. Hand nailers can produce about 500 per day.
