weight barge rate from Portland to Unadilla plus a truck rate of 17 cents from Unadilla to Spokane. Charge for handling at the up-river terminal, he estimated, would be negligible.

Handling Cost Held Low

On the other hand, Thompson testified that a charge of 5 cents per hundredweight for such terminal operations "would not be too high," indicating that the combined cost of handling by barge and truck to Spokane, including terminal expense, would be nearer 30 cents per hundredweight than the 25 cents proposed by the railroads.

Thompson added: "We do not think anybody could haul gasoline up the river for 7 1/2 cents a hundredweight and even break even." He said that his company, within the time of the hearing, has been offered gasoline cargoes at the going rate of 13 1/2 cents per hundredweight to Atlanta.

"We will probably have to lower our rates if the rail rate is reduced to the 25-cent level," he concluded.

Truck Rate Attacked

Lounsbury, in his testimony, attacked a new rate schedule proposed during the hearing by motor carriers who are protesting the rail rate reduction.

"We may find it necessary to submit applications to revise rates at short notice if the proposed truck rates go into effect," Lounsbury warned. "If the truck scale is approved, it will create lower rates into Idaho than we have any idea of."

The proposed rail rate reductions apply only as far east as Baker on the Union Pacific main line. Asked by J. W. Cornell, president of the Idaho public utilities commission, if the Union Pacific planned to extend reductions into Idaho, Lounsbury replied: "Not at present."

A development of the day was the withdrawal of all objections to truck lines' request for expansion of the scope of the hearing to include all motor carrier rates in eastern Washington and Oregon and in Idaho. The I. C. C. will act on the request.

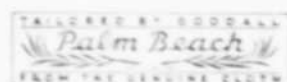
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
