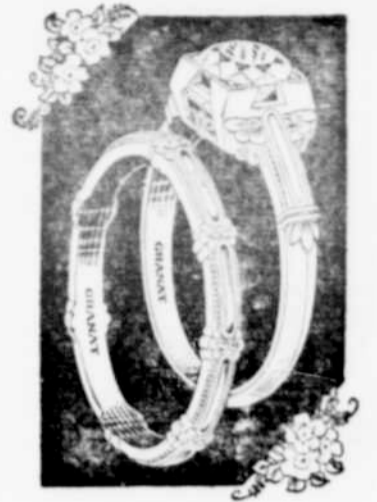
NAMED TO HEAD B. P. O. ELKS
