

istrator of the Bonneville project, the city. announced that the agency will be ready to deliver power as soon as the Wasco and Hood River districts obtain distribution facilities.

Bids to Be Asked Bids for construction of a 110,000-volt line through both P. U. D.s to The Dalles will be asked in less than 30 days, Banks said, and the line will be completed not later than June 30, 1940.

Banks promised aid to Wasco county in "solving their engineer-

ing and accounting problems. The Wasco county P. U. D., strongest in population and industries yet formed in Oregon, was approved in The Dalles by a vite of 1086 to 802, but the smaller towns of Dufur and Mosier voted to stay out of the district, 24 Yes and 38 No, and 10 Yes and 93 No, respectively.

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

(Continued from Page One) will run northeast to Grand Coulee, passing through Skamania, Klickitat, Yakima, Kittitas, Chelan, Douglas and Lincoln counties, a distance of 239 miles.

The Vancouver-Aberdeen line, starting at Vancouver, runs northwest to Aberdeen, passing through Clark, Cowlitz, Lewis, Wahkiakum, Pacific and Grays Harbor counties, an approximate distance of 127 miles.

The Kelso-Cathlamet line, starting at Kelso, runs northwest through Cowlitz and Wahkiakum counties, about 30 miles, and the Vancouver-Eugene line starts at Vancouver, running south to the Columbia river, about 2.77 miles.

The department of the interior, in sponsoring this project proposal, has pledged \$486,800 to purchase materials and supplies and has asked the WPA for allocations of \$1,988,834 to cover labor costs.

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
