On Wednesday a detachment of U. S. troops from Vancouver and Walla Walla passed through this place. They were the escort of Gen. R. F. Gibson, who left Vancouver barracks the middle of July to visit the Warm Springs Indian agency on official business. The following companies composed the escort, under command of Col. Davis: F troop, 2d cavalry, Walla Walla; I company, 14th infantry, Vancouver; and E, Battery, 1st artillery, Vancouver. They returned by the McKenzie route, and were making twenty-four miles per day, which, considering the dust, we think is quite enough. They were well equipped for the trip.
Mr. Clement Eckels, whose death we mentioned last week was killed on the 7th inst. by a train while walking on a railroad track near Oakland. He was born near Millford, Essex county, Delaware, March 26, 1825. When a boy his parents removed to Naples, Ill., where he was raised. He crossed the plains to California in 1852, and came to Lafayette, August 1853. On April 18, 1854, he was united in marriage to Miss I. N. Christman, of Yamhill county, who with six children, survives him. Mrs. Eckels and her eldest son brought the body to Oregon for burial, and will spend some time here with Mrs. A. R. Burbank, who was Mr. Eckels's sister.
Last Saturday as a party of three ladies and one gentleman, who reside near Turner station, Marion county, were driving into Salem the team became frightened at a switch engine near the depot. At the time the team took fright the wagon was on a bridge about twelve feet from the ground. The frightened horses commenced to back and before they could be stopped all were thrown overboard to the rocky bed below. The people all received severe injuries, and at this writing it is thought the man and one of the ladies cannot recover. A purse is being raised for the relief of the party, as they are worthy people in poor circumstances. The man has since died.
