It is said that the public schools in Leadville, Col., have been closed for one year for lack of funds, although the town supports 1,100 saloons.

A Kentucky paper puts it in this way: "Whisky is the cause of nearly all crime, misery and disorder. Strike it out, and striking will cease. Framp it out and tramps will cease. Stab it to the heart, and hearts will no longer be stabbed. Put an everlasting end to the mean thing, and meanness will be the exception and not the rule."

Justice Greer, of the United States supreme court, recently said: "If a loss of revenue should accrue to the United States from a diminished consumption of ardent spirits, she will be the gainer of a thousandfold in the health, wealth and happiness of the people."

Ireland is said to be the poorest country in the world. The reason for this condition of things is due in part undoubtedly to English misrule, but the great reason is found in the fact that her annual drink bill amounts to more than \$53,000,000. The temperance question is the greatest question before the Irish as well as before the American people.

The door of a dramshop is the gate to poverty and crime. When you run run out of politics you may expect politics to run run out of the country. Dr. Holmes says: "Bad air, bad whisky and irregular habits keep the doctors alive." The Christian Instructor says: "A saloon can no more be run without using up boys, than a flouring-mill without wheat, or a sawmill without logs. The only question is, whose boys—your boys or mine; our boys, or our neighbors?"

The saloon is the great shame and blot upon our civilization to say nothing our Christianity. Today most of the brawls upon our streets, the crimes that blot our record, the tragedies that fill our saloons; the record of the police court is but a partial record of the saloon; eight-tenths of the inmates of penitentiaries and jails came there through the saloons; the plotting of the anarchist is done in the saloon; a very large proportion of our papers arrived at that condition by the agency of the saloon, most of the corruption in our politics, both state and national, has its origin in the saloon. The saloon is by far the most dangerous school for our young men and boys. It is fascinating, entrapping and ruining more than all other agencies. It is all bad, it has no redeeming features, it is an abomination and a disgrace. Let us wipe it out, and let us remember that this cannot be done with homied phrases.

The Constitution thus refers to

prohibition in Atlanta: "The fellows who took advantage of our fight over prohibition to write Atlanta-down, have their trouble for their pain. Atlanta was never more prosperous than she is to-day, and she has grown and prospered steadily, even when the slanders were piled highest against her. The hundreds of stores and thousands of residences that were to be vacant are unaccountably filled. The period of dullness that was to paralyze our merchants, has given way to the busiest season and the biggest trade we have had for years. The million of dollars of capital that was to go away has not gone, and the streets that were to be depopulated are fuller of people than ever. It is stated that 6,400 out of the 8,688 saloon-keepers in New York city are ex-convicts. The agents of the New York city temperance society have been collecting statistics as to the number of saloons and retail liquor shops in the metropolis, and the result of its labor is astonishing. It appears that there are 8,688 saloons and 511 stores where liquor is retailed, or a ratio of one saloon for every twenty-eight voters."

The Anarchist excitement has resulted in measures looking to the organization of a new American party whose objects are to regulate emigration, to compel a residence of fourteen years preliminary to voting, and to prevent land monopoly. "We want," one of the projectors declares, "to fill this country with men of American ideas, freedom of speech and action, but within the laws and under the constitution."
