## ODD TURKISH STORIES. A Great Nation Ruled by the Superstitle Fancies of Its Officials.

Some curious stories of Turkish superstition are related by the anonymous author of "Stambul und der Moderne Turkenthum," the most light-giving ofrecent works on the internal condition of the Turkish empire. The mysterious caprice with which distinguished arrivals at Constantinople are treated by the Sultan and his Ministers is explained by an anecdote of the wellknown astronomer Peters when he visited Constantinople in 1850 with letters of introduction from Humboldt and other eminentmen of science. Predecessors The British sovereign, or pound sterling, is a legal tender to unlimited amount, and contains 113 grains of While George Baker and Alexander hours after the terrible accident oc- fine gold, alloyed with 2 grains of copper to every 22 grains fine. Coins of gold first came into use in the reign of Edward III., his 'noble'' being valued at 6s. 8d., but as it gradually increased in value until it became 10s., Edward VI. replaced the former coin by an "angel," which continued till the Commonwealth. The 'mark'' was a "double angel," valued at 13s. 4d. The name severeign was first given to the "double "royal" stamped with the figure of Henry VII., and was made current for 20s.; Henry VIII. called it a "unit," and stamped it with the Roman numerals XX .: Charles I. called it a guinea, because the gold emanated from the Guinea coast. Guineas were first coined in 1663; later this coin fluctuated in value from 20s. to 21s., until George I. declared it a representative of 21s. After this we had a double standard, until in 1816 the sovereign in its present form was again made identical with the pound sterling, and the silver coins became mere tokens, deriving their value from the pound, as at present. The half sovereign was the "noble" of Edward III. and the "royal" of Henry VII.-Longman's Magazine.
