COMET-SEEKING AND ITS PROFITS.

Comet-seeking is recommended presentation: by Mr. W. F. Denning, the English astronomer, as attractive work for amateurs with telescopes of four to ten inches in aperture. No systematic search for comets is made in Europe, and the fame and spoils of comet-finding are chiefly won by two indefatigable American observers-Barnard at Nashville, Tenn., and Brooks at Phelps, N. Y. Each of these astronomers has discovered nine comets in six years, and of the Warner prizes—which have added much to the interest of this department of astronomy-they have received over \$2,700. Many comets of course elude discovery, but the number of those detected has greatly increased during recent years, having been only fourteen in the decade 1827 to 1836 and forty-nine in the decade 1877 to 1886.
