ASTORIA'S RAILROAD.

The Astoria Pioneer says the Southern Pacific railroad will build a branch line from Forest Grove to Astoria, and that surveys will be in the field in sixty days. Such a road has been talked of for years. It would not only be of immense value to Astoria, but it would go a long way toward reducing the exorbitant expense of towage and pilotage, which now comes out of the farmers' pockets. Portland is in a position to sustain herself against Astoria competition, but with the completion of the above line times will change. We have always believed Astoria would gain the prominence to which her position entitles her, and the one thing needful is rail communication with the interior. Portland will probably always keep in the lead. It has wealth and influence, and has a country tributary capable of sustaining a great city. The time is past, however, when Portland can expect to do all the business of this northwest coast. We hope to see the road built soon. It was stated recently by a well known railroad man that the present owners of the O. & C. road had their eyes on Astoria, and prize it very highly as a shipping point. He further said they had recently several men in the field quietly examining the country along the proposed route. The informant felt satisfied that a road would be built to Astoria in the near future.

DENNIS KEARNEY.
