

THE SUPERINTENDENCY.

The duties of the office of county superintendent of schools are peculiar. For the discharge of these duties and for the welfare of the schools of the county a candidate should be chosen for that office who is competent. A man who can teach a successful school, one who understands the principles upon which the educational system of our state is founded, is a safe man to entrust with the office of county superintendent. Moreover he must have broad and liberal views; must be up with the times in educational matters; must be willing to work zealously for the cause of education. Before the day upon which the voters of Yamhill will vote for a candidate for this office Prof. Carl Young will have been principal of the Lafayette school two years. That he has given satisfaction is drawing it mild. There are patrons of this school who will tell you that for twenty years they have not had so good a school as now. He is qualified in every particular for this important office. He graduated from a normal school and completed a course at Baldwin university. He is in possession of a state certificate, and during the coming vacation will complete his examination for a life diploma. It will be remembered that he was a candidate for this office two years ago, and notwithstanding the fact that he had then not been long in the county, and was little known, he made a good run. The democracy of Yamhill should, in our opinion, do justice to itself and to Mr. Young, by placing him in nomination for county superintendent.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

The democratic county convention met at the courthouse, in Lafayette, on Wednesday, March 21, 1888.

The business of the convention was to elect six delegates to the state convention which meets at Pendleton, April 3d.

W. L. Bradshaw was elected chairman, John Thompson, secretary, and J. W. Jingle, assistant secretary.

Committees were appointed on credentials, order of business, and resolutions, after which the convention adjourned until 1 o'clock.

Upon reassembling, the committees reported. Following are the resolutions reported, and adopted by the convention: WHEREAS: The democrats of Yamhill county, in convention assembled, recognize in view of the forthcoming campaign, the importance of the great questions now pending before the people at large; therefore be it

Resolved: That we endorse the present administration of President Cleveland as one in harmony with democratic principles, and of advantage to the agricultural and business interests of the whole country, recognizing the one great principle of "the greatest good to the greatest number."

Resolved: That we endorse the administration of Gov. Penneyer, as an able and consistent fulfillment of his pledges to the people of Oregon; showing prudence and foresight in the discharge of his executive duties.

Resolved: That the democrats of Yamhill county hereby reaffirm the statement, that in the nomination of candidates for office, we recognize honesty, efficiency and integrity as the one and only criterion.

Balloting for delegates to the state convention resulted in the election of H. L. Heath, of South McMinnville; W. L. Bradshaw, of Lafayette; J. W. Briedwell, of Amity; P. H. Messner, of North Yamhill; D. H. Hartson, of Dayton; and C. C. Ferguson, of West Chehalam.

Several short speeches were made for the good of the cause, after which, on motion of Wm. Galloway, the delegates were instructed to vote for W. D. Fenton for delegate to the national democratic convention which meets in St. Louis, June 4th. Adjourned.
