The republican state convention met at Portland on Wednesday. It had no serious work to do. The nominations were practically made long ago, and it only remained for the convention to confirm them. The platform is as long and as indefinite as usual. Hon. Binger Hermann for congress, and W. P. Lord for supreme judge were nominated without opposition. For presidential electors, C. W. Fulton, of Clatsop; Wm. Kapus, of Multnomah; and Rob't. McLean, of Klamath; were nominated. The dele gates to the national convention are: J. Bourne, Jr., Multnomah; Z. F. Moody, Wasco; Rufus Mallory, Multnomah; J. W. Cusick, Linn; J. E. Bean, Umatilla; F. P. Mays, Wasco. H. H. Hewitt, of Albany, received the nomination for district attorney for this district, defeating Geo. G. Bingham, of Salem, and J. A. C. Freund, of Mc-Minnville. J. W. Maxwell was nominated for joint representative for Yamhill and Tillamook.

The republican county convention of Multnomah endorsed Jos. Simon and ring rule. This is what the Portland News says of it: "All earnest and conscientious republicans depreciate the style of politics which was too apparent on the surface of Saturday's convention. If quiet acquiescence in the methods in vogue is indulged in, we shall soon have in Portland a Boss Tweed or Chris Buckley, from whose authority or dictation there is no appeal, and if anyone dare question the right of the few to dictate to the many, he will be drummed out of the party as a renegade or 'kicker.'"

Congress has yet taken no action upon the bill recently submitted to both houses by the president, relative to the wagon-road land-grabbers in Oregon. Justice to the honest settlers in that state, however, demands that the message of of the president shall receive prompt and careful attention. To encourage settlers, and to promote the convenience of those already located, the government promised generous gifts of land to the persons who should build wagon roads through the undeveloped portions of the state. Few roads have been built and few are in process of building. But a ring of land-grab. bers has laid claim to hundreds of square miles of land upon the strength of fictitious roads whos-

INVESTIGATING THE ACCIDENT.

Last Saturday morning State Railroad Commissioners Slater and Waggoner, and clerk J. R. N. Bell, went to a point on the Portland & Willamette Valley railroad two and a half miles beyond Oswego, the scene of the fatal accident of March 22d. They found the track in good condition and there was nothing to indicate from appearances that the accident was the result of any defect in the track or bridge. .The commissioners seemed satisfied that it was caused by a lurch of the cattle, at the critical moment when the train was on the bridge. Engineer Watson and Brakeman Phillips, who were on the train at the time of the accident, gave testimony which does not differ from the account of the wreck given in the Oregonian. On Monday the commissioners visited Good Samaritan hospital and took the evidence of some of the injured persons, and at the next monthly meeting will make known their decision. Civil Engineer H. Hawgood is preparing a statement, also a drawing of the road as it approaches the bridge, which will be furnished to the commissioners.→Oregonian.

THE OREGON PACIFIC.-The Portland Telegram is responsible for the following: "The Oregon Pacific railway borrowed \$15,000,000 last month to build its line gon. from Albany to Boise City, and also some | 36-6t branch lines and first-class steamers. It is rumored that it is the intention of both the Chicago & Northwestern and the Manitoba (Jim Hill) roads to build to Boise City and there join the Oregon Pa cific, sending their San Francisco busi ness via Yaquina bay, and reaching Portland by fast steamer on the Willamuntil they can build : line through the Mollalla, Clackamas and Eagle creek section to terminal grounds in East Portland. It looks like these two roads were furnishing the money to the Oregon Pacific, and it is surmised that it is their intention to absorb the narrow gauge system. This will not only furnish a new outlet for Eastern Oregon, but the Chicago & Northwestern and the Jim Hill roads would then have the cream of the Willamette valley business.
