THAT LETTER.

Hon. Binger Hermann has written a letter (which accidentally fell into democratic hands) to the secretary of the national republican committee, urging the payment of \$1,000 "advanced by Hon. Joseph Simon, of Portland, Oregon, chairman of the republican state central committee, at our last election." Mr. Hermann recognizes the great importance of having the friendship and hearty support of this same Simon, and as a means of securing this influence he is anxious about the settlement of all claims due Mr. Simon. Mr. Hermann continues: "The senators of Oregon as well as myself who were parties in some sense, are appealed to by Mr. Simon and his friends who think great injustice has been done him. We cannot afford to have any misunderstanding at this time in Oregon, as at the best we shall have a narrow escape from defeat, if we do not suffer it. * * * Oregon is in danger." According to this opinion, which is not to be questioned, Oregon is indeed a doubtful state. With Jos. Simon and his following against him no republican can be elected in this state, and of this fact Binger Hermann is painfully cognizant.
