A Compromise from Beginning to End.

FRIENDS OF LAFAYETTE TAKE THEIR MEDICINE LIKE LITTLE MEN.

The day set for the republican county convention was looked forward to with more than ordinary interest. The democratic convention had met and done its work, but not with the best of feeling, however. Republicans claimed to be as much interested in the questions before our people as the democrats, and as the latter had nominated commissioners from the western part of the county it was to be hoped that the republicans would name candidates from the eastern part. But here the compromise was made and each section was given a candidate for that important office. Under the circumstances they can only expect to elect one of their candidates, and may be not one, even.

Delegates and candidates commenced to arrive at an early hour on Monday, May 7th, but all seemed content to stand around in crowds and discuss the probable result of the day's deliberations. It was not until 10:40 a. m. that the convention was called to order by P. P. Gates, chairman of the county central committee.

E. C. Hadaway, of Amity, moved that Hon. Lee Laughlin act as temporary chairman; carried. Mr. Laughlin thanked the convention and counselled that harmony and good feeling should prevail. On motion of Wilson Carl, of Carlton, John Wortman was chosen temporary secretary.

On motion of E. C. Hadaway, a committee of one from each precinct was appointed on credentials. The motion stated that each delegation should name its member of the committee, but it was amended and the chair was authorized to appoint, which he did as follows:

E. C. Hadaway moved that J. L. Rogers act as assistant secretary; carried. Ed. Fellows moved a recess till 11:30; carried.

Convention reassembled at the appointed time. The report of the committee on credentials not having been handed in, the secretary was instructed to ascertain when the committee would be ready to report, and found that it would not be ready before 1 o'clock.

On motion of E. B. Fellows, a committee on permanent organization and order of business, was appointed as follows: E. B. Fellows, P. P. Gates and E. H. Woodward. Convention adjourned till 1 o'clock.

AFTERNOON.

At 1 p. m. the convention reassembled, and some little delay was occasioned by the committee on credentials, which had been in session about two hours. From Amity precinct ten men claimed to be regularly elected delegates, yet that precinct was only entitled to nine. The committee compromised the matter by requesting that Amity be "allowed" ten delegates instead of nine, and so reported as follows:

The nomination of two representatives, two commissioners, one sheriff, one assessor, one surveyor, one school superintendent, one coronor; and the reorganization of republican central committee. E. B. FELLOWS, Chairman. Report amended and the ratification of the nomination of Hon. J. W. Maxwell for joint representative of Yamhill and Tillamook counties, was made first on the order of business; adopted as amended.

Dr. Watts moved that voting be by ballot and that it require a majority of all votes cast to nominate; carried. Tellers were appointed as follows: P. P. Gates, F. M. York, G. F. Tucker and W. A. Graves. Nominations were declared in order for REPRESENTATIVES.

Second ballot—Derby, 34; Laughlin, 35; Cooper, 20; Davis, 9; Little, 11, scattering, 6. Third ballot—Derby, 42; Cooper, 16; Laughlin, 52; Davis, 1; Little, 1; Barnekoff, 2. Fourth ballot—Laughlin, 77; Derby, 42; Cooper, 5. Laughlin nominated.

Fifth ballot—Derby, 83; Cooper, 23; Little, 3, scattering, 6. Derby nominated. Dr. Watts here moved that the rules be suspended and the nomination of H. H. Hewitt for district attorney be ratified; carried.

FOR SURVEYOR. J. C. Cooper was placed in nomination by Dr. Watts. Cooper declined. On motion the rules were suspended and Cooper was nominated by acclamation. Convention called on Cooper for a speech, and he said: "Republicans of Yamhill county, if you want me to run on your ticket, I wish to say to you and especially to the republicans of Sheridan precinct, that I am not the man who stole the sheep."

First ballot—Crawford, 28, Baker, 53, Parker, 3, Buchanan, 12, Edmonds, 15, blank, 2. Second ballot—Baker, 81, Crawford, 17, Buchanan, 3, Edmonds, 12. Baker nominated.

FOR CORONER. Wm. Chrisman moved the rules be suspended and E. B. Fellows declared nominated; carried. Fellows was called for and made the closing speech of the convention.
