CINE LIKE LITTLE MEN.

The day set for the republican county convention was looked forward to with more than ordinary interest. cratic convention had met and done its work, but not with the best of feeling, however. Republicans claimed to be as much interested in the questions before our people as the democrats, and as the latter had nominated commissioners from the western part of the county it was to be hoped that the republicans would name candidates from the eastern part. But here the compromise was made and each section was given a candidate for that important office. Under the circumstances they can only expect to elect oce of their candidates, and may be not
