Next Monday the voters of Yamhill county will decide who shall perform the duties of the office of recorder for the next two years. John Thompson, present deputy clerk, by virtue of his past experience, is better qualified for this important office than any other man in Yamhill county. It must be remembered that a new office has been created, and new books are to be opened. It is a fact worthy of mention that attorneys and others from other counties, who have had occasion to examine the records of this county, testify that they are kept in a cleaner and neater order than are the records of any other county in the state.

COL. JOHN P. IRISH.

This eminent and gifted orator addressed a large audience in the court yard Tuesday afternoon. His is the most eloquent and comprehensive speech on the tariff ever listened to in Oregon, and we are only sorry that we cannot reproduce it entire.

Mr. Irish opened his remarks by advertng to the resolutions adopted by a late republican county convention, in which he was stigmatized as an emissary and referred to in uncomplimentary terms. He replied to these insulting and uncalled-for strictures in so sarcastic, yet courteous, manner, that even the committee which drafted them felt heartily ashamed of themselves. He also paid the member of the state republican committee, for this county, a deserved compliment (?).

Mr. Irish, referring to the tariff question, said it was the most momentous which had engrossed the American people for many years. Every year over \$60,000,000 taxes were raised than the government required to pay current expenses with, which were deliberately wrung from the public and benefited very few, tempting the cupidity of congress and inviting extravagance and recklessness. To reduce this surplus and remove this unnecessary burden on the people, limiting taxation to the expenses of the government economically administered, was the mission of the democratic party, as enunciated in President Cleveland's first message to the present congress. If the officials of Oregon should levy a tax every year of \$100,000 more than was necessary and hoard it up in the treasury, the voters would soon revolt and remove the offenders. Just so it would be with congress if it were not for the fact that this extra sum, large as it is, was not raised under the specious plea of "protecting" the manufacturing industries, of the United States. The people were opposed to the ideas of Blaine, Sherman and others, who propose to take the tax off tobacco and whisky and allow it to remain on the necessities of life. These articles were simply luxuries, which could be dispensed with *ad libitum*, and those who used them were simply paying a voluntary tax.

Mr. Irish said very many other good things, which we would be pleased to give our readers, but lack of space forbids. The democratic ladies showed excellent taste and skill in decorating the improvised stand with the meagre means at hand. Col. Irish also spoke to a full house at McMinnville in the evening, but owing to his tired and worn-out condition, he could not do himself nor his subject justice. The opera house was artistically and superbly decorated; there was vocal and instrumental music, and the best of feeling prevailed.

The Eastern Oregon Scout, an independent paper, has this to say: "During the last month we have talked with many republicans who are in favor of low tariff. Such naturally belong to the opposite party and should vote the democratic ticket. Dolph, Mitchell and Hermann and the rest of the republican members of congress, with but few exceptions, vote for the retention of the present high protective tariff, while the democratic members; with few exceptions, are in favor of substantial reductions. A vote for Hermann or the republican legislative ticket is a vote for high tariff. No other issue is before the people and men should be frank and honest in voting upon the question."

Rev. I. D. Driver in his speeches says: "I have never in all my life had anything to do with politics any farther than to vote my sentiments. And I am here to-night to keep my church and its members out of politics." If the doctor wants to be consistent he will let his church and its members vote their sentiments, too.

Blaine has written another letter—not to Fisher—but to Whitelaw Reid, in which he says he will not be a candidate.

A vote cast next Monday for Geo. W. Belt for district attorney will be a credit to every voter.
