AN APPEAL TO TEACHERS.

A pure childhood must precede and prepare for pure manhood and womanhood. The powers of evil are conspiring to debauch childhood, the powers of good must combine to protect it. The public school is the great battle-ground for souls. One grand division of the white ribbon army there masses its forces to combat intemperance; another is now marshaling its hosts to combat the equally deadly foe, impurity. Only clear-eyed teachers can know the temptations in this direction, which beset children through evil companions and vile literature sown broadcast, yet secretly—as by the hands of Satan himself.

We remember one instance which came to our knowledge: Every desk in a public school, was found, one morning, supplied with such a leaflet as no pure-minded person should see, and no one could imagine how the deed was done, as the house was never left alone, except when every room was locked. It transpired that, as usual after sweeping, the janitor had left the windows open for a short time while the dust was settling. The emissary of Satan was on the watch, and during this short interval slipped in through the window and sowed the vile seed.

No wonder that Ellise Hopkins says: "The only thing that has filled me with the darkness of despair is, not the facts about our back streets, but the facts about our public and our private schools." Many of us have learned from sad experience that "innocence and childhood are not synonymous terms." These things being so the W. C. T. U., which is "organized motherhood," can but feel the deepest interest in efforts to guard the boys and girls who go out from the home to the school. The National Teachers' Association in Chicago last summer, in response to an appeal by Miss Willard, adopted strong resolutions looking to the preservation of the purity of pupils. Similar appeals to state and local associations have met favorable responses.

Mrs. C. P. Wallace, superintendent of white cross and white shield work in Missouri, has sent out to the teachers of her state an appeal so excellent, that we give extracts from it which are applicable to all localities: "The peril of the times calls for heroic efforts. Silence is not only cowardly, but criminal, when this evil is manifestly corrupting our youths, destroying the sanctity of home, and working the demoralization that will bring decay and ruin to our nation. It is the part of patriotism, of Christianity, of humanity, to meet it bravely and overcome the evil with good—with the plain teaching of purity. Few persons hold positions of so much responsibility—of opportunity for such widespread influence as the teachers—the array of teachers we have now in our land, who in their work, reach and touch all classes, from the highest to the lowest. A right knowledge and appreciation of the body, "as the temple of the living God," would lead to greater care and reverence for self, each one for his own body, so fearfully and wonderfully made. To this end, we ask for vigilant care of children in the schoolroom, the dormitory, and on the play-

ground, that their lips and hands may be kept clean, their eyes clear and hearts pure. We ask for such hygiene and physiological instruction as will make them familiar, in so far as possible, with nature's laws—laws as inexorable to-day as in the beginning—that children may early learn to avoid the penalty of sorrow and suffering that surely follows the infraction of these laws. We ask that they may be vigilantly guarded against the great danger from obscene books and illustrations now so widely and freely scattered. As an aid to overcome this influence, we would urge that in all grades the social purity pledge cards be introduced, bringing them to the attention of the youngest as well as the oldest pupils—the pledge of the Daughters of the Temple for girls and that of the Silver Cross for boys, training our boys to the true chivalry of the Knights of the White Cross, moulding them in the strong and tender manhood of the Christ."
