NATIONAL TEACHERS .MEETING.

The National Educational Association for the United States will be held at San Francisco during the week beginning July 15. This promises to be one of the most interesting Associations ever held in America: The reports coming from the Eastern States indicate that the attendance will be equal to if not greater than ever before: This prospect is remarkable in view of the fact that the Association is to be held at San Francisco, a point almost 2000 miles west of the center of population. CELEBRATIONS.

The Fourth of July is, and ever has been since 1776, the most patriotic demonstration of the people of this fair land. It is a grand and good omen when all citizens of the common 'country, irrespective of political or other beliefs can unite in celebrating the event to which we owe so much.

'There were two celebrations in this county-one at McMinnville, and the other at Newberg. Both were largely attended, and the reading of the Declaration of Independence, the letters patent handed down to us by our forefathers, giving a clear title as it does to the liberty they so dearly loved and valiantly fought for, was enjoyed by all who could get near enough to the stand to hear. The orations were fittingly delivered by ministers of the Gospel. Rev. Van Scoy, president of the Willamette University, was the orator at Newberg, and Rev. Jordon, of the Baptist church, orated at McMinnville. There was band music and other attractions during the day, which would compare favorably with larger and more pretentious towns.

It is estimated that 800 or 1000 people were at Newberg; and all are agreed that there never were so many people gathered together in this county before, as were at McMinnville. We suppose there were 5000 or 6000 persons present, and yet there was the best of order and decorum observed throughout the day.

There were contests of speed on the fair ground, but under an entire different magement from that of the celebration. It was an attraction, perhaps, to a great many, and yet there was a great deal of fault found with the price of admission, and the whole arrangement.

The ragamuffins or pluguglies were gotten up in good shape and played their part well. We missed seeing the ladies sword drill, and therefore can't say how it was. A large crowd came down on the culturist, and the Grange Bulletin, by train from Polk county, and a good many from Washington county were in atten-
