NATIONAL TEACHERS MEETING.

The National Educational Association for the United States will be held at San

Francisco during the week beginning July 15. This promises to be one of the

most interesting Associations ever held in America: The reports coming from

the Eastern States indicate that the attendance will be equal to if not greater

than ever before: This prospect is remarkable in view of the fact that the As-

sociation is to be held at San Francisco, a point almost 2000 miles west of the center

of population. Ten thousand teachers from the Western States alone are al-

ready booked for San Francisco, to say nothing of the numerous excursions

of teachers coming from the Middle State, the Southern States, and the New

England States.

In order, therefore, that all teachers, friends of education and citizens in Oregon

may have an opportunity of attending the association (as well as visiting

points of interest in California) the several transportation companies in this

State have arranged to make the following round-trip excursion rates from

The O. P. Co., will sell round-trip excursion tickets from Albany or Cor-

vallis to San Francisco and return for \$14, and will include meals and berths

on the steamers.

Tickets by all the above lines will be on sale July 7th to 15th, and are good

for return till September 30th. And all these rates are open to any person. For

CORNER STONE LAID.

On Thursday, June 28, 1888, the corner stone of the Yamhill County court

house was laid at McMinnville by the Masonic Grand Lodge. The Masons,
