The Portland News suspended publication last Saturday on account of a lack of funds. It was started in January, 1883, and during its unsuccessful career of six years, it changed ownership several times, and from \$140,000 to \$160,000 were sunk in the News.

Most people want a paper of their own and besides, feel under some obligation to patronize the home paper because it is a benefit to the community at large.—Dallas Democrat.

LAND MARK GONE.—One of the first buildings erected within the present limits of this city was the old mill at the foot of Third street. This mill was built in 1852-53 by Robert C. Kinney, and as it was among the first in the valley it furnished the flour for a large territory. It passed through several hands and was kept running until 1882. In the year Mr. Sax built the brick mill on the opposite side of the creek, and all the available machinery of the mill was put into the new. The old frame, however, was left standing until last Saturday, when it had succumbed to the march of progress. Jones & Co. having purchased the land, upon which they will soon commence the erection of a planing mill, sash and door factory, it was necessary to tear down the old land mark, that task was too hazardous, so it was burned down. One by one the busy haunts of former days are disappearing.

BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION.
Last week another enterprise was inaugurated in this city. It is a branch of the American Building and Loan Association of Minneapolis. The main features of all loan associations are nearly the same. The object of this organization is to loan money to its stockholders at 6 per cent per annum, and each stockholder is entitled to a loan of \$500 on each share on which amount he pays 6 per cent interest. When membership is applied for, the first month's payment is one dollar per share and after that 60 cents per share until the stock matures, which will be in from 6 to 7 years. When the stock matures the stockholders receive 100 dollars in cash money if they have obtained a loan. If a member has borrowed money from the association he receives his note back and his mortgage is cancelled at maturity of the stock. This association is the most extensive of the building associations of the United States, it having between 500 and 600 branches throughout the country.

The officers of the McMinnville branch are: J. W. Cowles, president; E. W. Fuller, secretary and agent; McMinnville National Bank, treasurer; and J. E. Magers, attorney. There is also a board of ten directors composed of prominent business men and others of the city.
