THE FOURTH OF JULY.

Our "Glorious Fourth." Yes, this is time for our loudest cheers; this is time when the great heart of our nation glows with enthusiasm; when all feeling is forgotten and each of us become alike the day which brought us liberty, independence and peace to our country.

Nearly a hundred years ago the "Scotch Bard" asked in his own beautiful language there a man with soul so dead, who never to himself has said 'tis is my own, my native land?"

And to-day we reiterate the question, never in all our fair America could such one be found. This is the one hundred and tenth anniversary of our country's natal day.

Mrs. Sarah Vandyn, who died recently at the family residence near Coburg, Lane county, aged 71, crossed the plains from Missouri with her husband and family of young children in 1851, and he thirty-four years of time that has elapsed since then she has spent on the homestead where she closed her well spent life.

In Washington territory, Monday, an election was held to settle the question of prohibition in that territory. Thirty-one precincts from sixteen counties, gave a majority of 3,109 against prohibition.

The endorsement of President Cleveland's administration by Oregon does not pan out much, after all. The democratic governor-elect has written a letter to friends in Washington, in which he distinctly denies that the administration question entered into the contest at all.

In one of the precincts of Union county no election was held, owing to the negligence of the judges of election. Had the vote been taken in this precinct it would have changed the result of the election, at least in one office, says the Sentinel.

Grafton, Dakota, special to the Pioneer Press: A strip of country twenty miles long by two miles wide around Inkster was pounded bare of crops by a terrible hail storm yesterday.

The issue of standard silver from the mints during the week ending June 26, was \$550,604. The shipments of fractional silver coin since June 1 amounts to \$524,885.

Providence, R. I., celebrated its 250th anniversary June 23, and Springfield, Mass., observed its 250th birthday some time ago. Both towns are "small of their age."

Wm. E. Smith assistant secretary of treasury has resigned and the president has appointed to fill the vacancy Hugh S. Thompson, governor of South Carolina.

A McNeil died suddenly at his home in Tacoma, W. T., June 23, aged 61. He was the father of Mrs. J. S. Cooper, of Independence.

Justice Stanley Matthews was married the 23d. In this case Justice was not blind; he chose a very charming helpmeet.

THE CONTEST OF 1888.

Republicans must not delude themselves with the idea that President Cleveland will not be a candidate for a second term. His nomination is about as certain as anything in the future, and his election may be classed among the probabilities, unless the republicans are thoroughly united and nominate some candidate who will have no personal antagonisms to conciliate, and whose personal qualifications will be such as to call forth the enthusiasm of the party.
