In Washington territory, Monday, an election was held to settle the question of prohibition in that territory. Thirtyone precincts from sixteen counties gave a majority of 3,109 against prohibition. The counties only adopted the local option law. Ten precincts that gave prohibition majorities, only gave a total majority of 598, while 21 preeinets gave a total majority of 3,707 against prohibition.
