THE ANTI-SALOON MOVEMENT.

The national convention of the antisaloon republicans at Chicago has adoptpractical action within the republican party for reform of the saloon eyil. The convention has been sneered at as unrepresentative. In fact it represented faithfully the strongest temperance element in the country; that element of clear-seeing republicans who, while profoundly convinced of the need of temperance reform, believe that the right and the only sure way to secure it is by compelling the party with which they are identified to make it a leading issue It is only a few months since the antisaloon movement was begun. It started in the face of ridicule and detraction .-From the outset it was misrepresented by the unrerupulous masquerading politicians who are endeavoring to create a third party which shall act as a tender to the democracy, under the pretence of advancing the cause of temperance .-Against discouragment, however, the movement proceeded, gathering strength continually, and indicating, by the earnestness of its subsidiary conventions, the sincerity and determination which have produced this national expression. The thoroughly practical character of

the movement is shown in the recommendations of the platform. No time or energy was thrown away in mere vague and general demands for measures too sweeping to offer any present hope of enactment, but it was proposed that the party should be required to effect everywhere the most and the best mode possible by local conditions. The practical tendency of such a programme is clearly shown by comparing it with the prohibition policy. The latter aims at obtaining the final results at once, and then dropped to 50 cents per square, and by purely independent means. The result, as experience has shown, is negative, or when not negative, suicidal. For either the prohibition is thrown away, or it goes to reinforce the democracy, which, says the New York Tribune, is the bulwark of the saloon in politics .-The anti-saloon movement proceeds differently. It begins by deducing from the facts of history the conclusion that the republican party embodies ninetenths of whatever reformatory and progressive tendencies are extant. It ar gues from this that whatever reform it is desirable to urge must, to succeed, obtain the support of the republican party. It then facilitates reform by adapting its measures to local conditions, rightly reasoning that it is better to se cure even a partial improvement where no more can at preset be had than to attempt too much and consequently fail is obtaining anything. And finally, to the objection that republican politicians have often shown themselves subservient to the saloon influence, it answers that the anti-saloon republicans intend to devote themselves to remedying that. cising all their political influence

There is not a step in this programme which ought not to be heartily approved by disinterested and intelligent advocates of temperance throughout the country. To the genuine prohibitionist it offers for the first time a practical and rational means of carrying into effect the convictions they entertain most strongly. To the friends of temperance who are not yet prepared for prohibition the new movement holds out a hope of gradual popular education which may produce permanent benefits. To all the proposal to remit the question to popular suffrage must approve itself as thoroughly consistent with democratic doctrines and institutions. Nor can there be any serious question as to the possibility or informing the republican party with the spirit and purposes of the Chicag o convention. The issue is one about which all men are thinking. The evils of the saloon, both in politics and society, are being recognized as never before. A spirit is growing up among thinking and patriotic men of a kind to sweep away any selfish obstruction, and this spirit has its lodgment in the republican party itself. The anti-saloon convention at Chicago is but an outward sign of a growing tendency and determination .-It is the beginning of organized action on the one line which promises enduring and solid results.

The Register publishers do not seem satisfied with our explanation of a week ago regarding the price charged for liti-
