Carlisle has been renominated for congress from the 6th district of Kentucky.

Henry George has been nominated for Mayor of New York by the labor organizations of that city.

The president appointed John McLean of California, to be interpreter to the United States consul-general at Kanagwa, Japan.

Belva Lockwood will run for president in 1888. She opened her campaign the other day by throwing a man out of her office.

A man named Nail is chairman of the Maryland republican committee. He is a handy man to have around when it is necessary to nail a campaign lie.

President Cleveland gained strength during his vacation, and now claims to be able to put up a medium weight veto 38 times without stopping to spit.

Returns from 100 towns give republicans 54 towns, democrats 31, divided 15. The same towns last year stood, republicans 49, democratic 34, divided 17; a net Republican gain of 5 towns. Connecticut is solid.

Thousands of birds of all kinds were killed by flying against telephone and electric light wires and towers at Danville, Ill., Saturday night. It is supposed they were in transit south and were attracted by the electric lights.

Wiggins is the most notorious fellow in America just now. If a false prophet can achieve such widespread fame, who can estimate the honors that would be heaped upon a true prophet, even though he came prophesying evil things?

The pleuro-pneumonia scare has extended to the plains of Montana, and quarantine is called against Chicago cattle. The territory has \$40,000,000 invested in cattle, and as the grass crop is short, it is feared there will be loss enough without running the additional risk of the Illinois cattle plague.

President Cleveland has finished his four weeks' vacation in the Adirondacks and has returned to his duties in Washington. It was usual for the democrats to find fault with republican presidents when they took a vacation, but we think any president is entitled to all the rest and recreation he can possibly get.

At present Portland appears to be having a lively skirmish on the water question. There is surely a good chance to improve the water used at that city and if it needs a fight to bring about this improvement the citizens can afford to stand off and hiss the competing companies on. And we "country jakes" will second the motion.

The present rage for political nostrums and cure-alls undoubtedly results from the remarkable inactivity in the legitimate politics. The republican party has been so successful in carrying out and vindicating its politics and establishing them in the statutes and the confidence of the country that the democratic organization dares not join issue with it on a single prominent question, or venture to repeal any of the republican laws.

Last week but sixteen flour mills in Minneapolis were in operation, and generally made heavy runs, producing 132,810 barrels, averaging 25,135 barrels daily, against 148,280 the preceding week, and 75,215 barrels the corresponding time in 1885. Two more mills were added to the operative list, making the total eighteen, being crowded. The production for the week was about 140,000 barrels. A majority of the mills are now grinding new wheat to a great extent.

Wiggins has achieved notoriety. To be distinguished as this world goes is to be one man picked out of 10,000, and the man who is able to get head and shoulders above his fellows in the way of attracting attention is worthy a certain amount of consideration. OREGON'S SCHOOLS.—INTERESTING FIGURES.

State Supt. of Schools, E. B. McElroy is at present busily engaged in preparing the seventh biennial report of his office to the legislative assembly. From his comparative tables a Statesman representative gleams the following interesting figures regarding our schools:

Number of districts in 1886, 1371, as against 1336 in 1885; the average number days school per year in 1886 was 191.5, as against 95 in 1885; average salaries paid male teachers in 1886, \$46.20; female, \$34.65; average salaries paid male teachers in 1885, \$48.22; female, \$36.96; whole amount paid teachers in 1886, \$375,158.49; in 1885, \$342,186.37—Amount received from district tax, 1886, \$121,589.08; in 1885, \$141,124.38. From county tax in 1886, \$263,261.54; in 1885, \$200,141.81; from state funds, in 1886, \$75,565.11; in 1885, \$77,938.48; total amount of school funds, including receipts from other sources, rate bills, etc., 1886, \$901,272.26; in 1885, \$578,240.96; total value of school property in 1886, \$1,239,998; in 1885, \$1,169,433.14. Whole number of persons over four years and under twenty years of age, in 1885, was 83,018; in 1886, 82,860. This shows an increase of only 50,000 since 1873. The number of pupils enrolled in the public schools in 1885 was 46,107, and 49,176 in 1886. This shows an increase of 29,000 since 1874. The total average daily attendance at the public schools in 1886 was 35,245 as compared with 31,005 in 1885, and 14,389 in 1877. On March 1, 1886, there was \$76,770.47 in the hands of school district clerks. There were 148 private schools taught, their total time being 484 months. There were 117 school houses erected during the year ending March 1, and 1,258 had been previously erected, making a total of 1,375 school houses, of a value of \$1,144,384. The value of school furniture is \$84,657, and of apparatus, maps, charts, etc., \$10,957. In the year ending March 1, 1885, 109 school houses were built, and the value of school houses and school grounds was \$1,080,015.18. The number of pupils enrolled in private schools in 1886 was 5,423; in 1885 was 4,400. Number of persons of school age not attending any school in 1886 was 25,803 and 25,568 in 1885; number of teachers holding first grade certificates, 1204 in 1886, and 1059 in 1885; holding second grade 677 in 1886 and 668 in 1885. There were 271 teachers employed in private schools in the year 1886 and 210 in 1885. The amount paid for rent of school rooms in 1886 was \$2,820.14; repairs of school houses and furniture, \$12,066.72; amount paid for school furniture, \$8,979.38; fuel and other incidentals, \$11,531.33; for apparatus, globes, charts, etc., \$1,853.62; for school house sites, \$1,779.81; for building school houses, \$124,469.73; for all school purposes during the year, \$316,271.02; total disbursements for school purposes, \$856,106.75. In 1886, number graded schools 53, employing 164 teachers; 7943 students attending; 15 academies, with 47 teachers and 1295 students attending; 9 colleges, 43 teachers, 1104 attending students. 147 public schools have Webster's unabridged dictionary; 224 are furnished with record books; 528 teachers are subscribers to an educational journal; county superintendents made 1124 school visits, averaging 28 minutes 25 seconds each; traveling 12,524 miles to make these visits, and receiving salaries ranging from \$50 in Tillamook to \$900 in Multnomah county.

Rev. J. B. Hill, publisher of the California Christian Advocate, died at Alameda, Cal., Tuesday morning.

Kettleman and George Smith will soon run for \$1000 a side and the championship of the United States. Fifteen cents on "Kit."

A natural gas well on the farm of David Fisher, near Savoy, Ill., suddenly ceased flowing during a cyclone on the 16th of Sept. Since then experts have exhausted every known means to renew the gas supply, but so far have been unsuccessful. How the storm could have effected the discharge of gas from a vein 150 feet below the surface is a mystery which no one is yet able to solve.

The 100 yard foot race between Ed Rea and George Noland for \$500 a side took place at Astoria, Saturday, and was won by Rea in 10 1/4 seconds. About \$3,200 were up on the race. Immediately after another race of 150 yards was arranged between Noland and Pete Grant for \$500 a side, to take place on October 23d. Rea is the man who was crowded into the ropes by Martin, at Salem.
