A dispatch to the Oregonian dated Washington, October 20th, says: The following communication, touching the captives was this afternoon addressed to Lieut.-Gen. Sheridan by the secretary of the disease. A quarantine has been war:

Lieut.-Gen. P. H. Sheridan, United States Army; Sir :- By direction of the president it is ordered that hostile Apaches, fifteen in number, recently captured in Mexico and now at San Antonio, Texas, be sent under proper guard, to Fort Pickens, Fla., there to be kept in close custody until further or ders. These Indians have been guilty of the worst crime known to law, committed under circumstances of great atrocity, and public safety requires that
