NOTES AND NEWS.

Mary Anderson has given \$2500 to the Charleston sufferers. Oakland, Ill., was destroyed by fire Tuesday night. Loss \$300,000.

The Vermont legislature has re-elected G. F. Edmunds United States senator.

The Knights of Labor favor the purchase of telegraph lines by the government.

Beecher is to be given a grand reception by his church on his return from Europe.

Col. Charles Whittlesey, the distinguished geologist and scholar, died at Cleveland, Ohio, Tuesday morning, in the 79th year of his age.

Charlie Knowles, near Hubbard, fooled with a loaded cartridge the other day. It went off, as usual, and tore away the thumb and fore finger of his right hand.

Samuel Canon, aged about twelve years, fell into the Willamette river at Corvallis, on Sunday, while fishing, and was drowned. The body was recovered.

The secretary of state has directed the collector of customs at San Francisco to extend all the courtesies possible to the Japanese princes who arrived there yesterday.

Wire and poles for the Mackay-Bennett line are on the ground between this city and Salem, and the holes are already dug for erecting the poles.

A German by the name of Reinhold Lupke, aged about 28 years, in the employ of Hon. F. E. Elbridge, near Gervais, committed suicide last Tuesday by shooting himself in the head.

The Chicago base ball club defeated the St. Louis nine, Tuesday, the first of a series, for the championship of the world, lost the second game and won the third and decisive game, subsequently.

A dispatch from Chicago says positively that Miss Rose Cleveland, the president's sister, has left the editorial chair of the Literary Life, and that lawsuits for damages for violation of contract are to follow.

Passenger statistics at San Francisco for the past nine months show 15,089 arrivals and 15,457 departures by water; overland 61,463 arrived and 46,365 departed. This is a gain of 1000 over the same time last year.

The Gray Encampment of Odd Fellows began their thirty-second annual session at San Francisco Wednesday.

The national convention of distillers, brewers, and liquor dealers met at Chicago on the 18th. There were 400 delegates present. The object of the convention is to form a national association for the purpose of combatting the agitation against the liquor interests by the prohibitionists and anti-saloon men.

Another one. This makes five inside of a month in Washington territory: James Fannon and Jimmy Gilson left Colville to hunt deer, October 5. They parted to circle a hill. When half way around Gilson heard a noise in the brush and supposed it to be a deer. He fired and was soon horror stricken to discover that he had shot and killed his friend.

THE HOSTILE APACHES.

A dispatch to the Oregonian dated Washington, October 20th, says: The following communication, touching the disposition of Geronimo and his fellow captives was this afternoon addressed to Lieut.-Gen. Sheridan by the secretary of war:

Lieut.-Gen. P. H. Sheridan, United States Army; Sir:—By direction of the president it is ordered that hostile Apaches, fifteen in number, recently captured in Mexico and now at San Antonio, Texas, be sent under proper guard, to Fort Pickens, Fla., there to be kept in close custody until further orders.

The remainder of the band captured at the same time, consisting of eleven women, six children and two enlisted scouts, you are to send to Fort Marion, Fla., and place with other Apache Indians recently conveyed to and now under custody at that post.

W. B. ENDICOTT, Secretary of War.

It is stated that the above order meets with the approval of the secretary of the interior. From its terms it appears that Geronimo and other hostiles are to be separated from their wives and families, who are to be sent to Fort Marion.

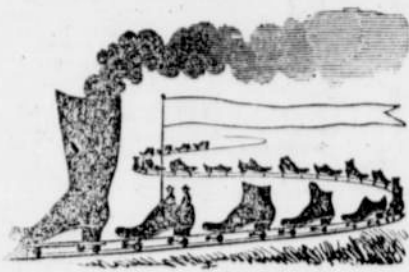
