South Carolina is again being shaken up with earthquakes.

John D. Siebe of San Francisco has filed a complaint demanding a recount of the ballot for assessor, claiming that Nealon's plurality was gained by fraud in counting the ballots.

And now the democratic papers are pitching into poor old John Kelly, of East Portland, calling him an anarchist, socialist, and all sorts of mean names, because he was gloriously left at the special election last week.

Colonel Robert G. Ingersoll will act as counsel for the anarchists of Chicago in the hearing of their appeal before the supreme court of Illinois.

Democrats and republicans will have an equal number of members in the next legislature of New Jersey, in which event neither party can elect a United States senator without the vote of John Donohue, who was elected by the labor party.

There is a good deal of whistling now going on among our democratic exchanges to keep up courage for 1888. In their figures they even go so far as to put such states as Massachusetts, Minnesota and California among the doubtful after putting New York, New Jersey and Colorado down as positively democratic.

Dispatches from London state that so long as India and Russia offer so little wheat as they are doing, the existing range in prices will be maintained.

Sunset Cox is making things lively around Washington. He has been elected to congress both to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Pulitzer, and for the fiftieth congress.

As a result of the stock-yards strike, a license has been secured for a corporation to be known as the Chicago Co-operative & Provision Company.

Democratic representatives arriving at Washington, from every part of the country announce with singular unanimity that Sunset Cox, of New York, the late minister to Turkey, will be the leader of their side of the house in the fiftieth congress.

In speaking of Russia's intentions, Capt. Lane, a British navy attaché, who has just finished a tour of observation around the Black sea, says, he has seen nothing to warrant the assumption that the Russians are meditating hostile action.

NOTES AND NEWS.

The town of Yale, several times before destroyed by fire, was partly burned Thursday. Supposed to be the work of incendiaries.

Two fools, George Hazlet and Miss Sadie Allen, of Buffalo, N. Y., went through Niagara rapids the other day in a barrel constructed for the purpose.

The Albany Herald tells us of a Santiam poultry keeper who raised 1,300 fine chickens this season, out of which he sold 100 and the rats ate 1,200.

Thoebe, the labor candidate who was opposed to Speaker Carlisle, is preparing a vigorous contest before congress. It is said that he relied upon the fears of both the republicans and Democrats as consequence of offending the labor element.

The Coast Mail says: "Cleveland has gained fifty pounds since he went into the White house, and wants some remedy to reduce his flesh. He promised to put some flesh on the bones of poor workingmen if elected, but now is putting it all on himself."

A. K. Cutting, the much-talked of filibuster, is now traveling through the eastern states on a lecturing tour. His subject is "Dungeon life in Mexico" and "A vigorous foreign policy."

Last Thursday the heavy cloth curtain, which during the day time covers the electric light lenses on the statue of liberty, caught fire and fell upon the light wood work of the staircase in the interior of the statue, and it was only by the hardest work that a bad fire was avoided, and the great statue saved from ruin.

Last week some Portland children found a bottle containing about a pound of powder, and utilized it for a plaything. One of them set a lighted candle in the bottle and when it had burned down sufficiently the wick dropped out and ignited the powder.

The advocates of the redemption of the trade dollar will make another effort this winter to secure the passage of the bill which already has the indorsement of the coinage committee, and is upon the house calendar.

The senate committee on printing will meet in a few days to formally resume the investigation of the government printing office, which was ordered at the last session. The question occurs whether Mr. Benedict, under the law, is eligible to the position of public printer.
