It has been hinted by one of our local papers that Yamhill is not receiving her share of the immigration that is so rapidly filling our state. There may be an answer to this question in the apathy in educational matters which has been so clearly pointed out. In other towns in our state where colleges are situated the whole people rejoice whenever the school year begins. The prominent citizens give receptions for the benefit of the students, and do all in their power to welcome to their society a worthy and deserving class of young people. When did McMinville wake up to her privileges and show her cordiality to students? More of this in another time.
