JOHN A. LOGAN DEAD.

Senator John A. Logan died at his home in Washington a few minutes before 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon surrounded by the members of his family and a great number of political associates.

General John Alexander Logan was born in Jackson county, Illinois, February 9, 1826, and was consequently in his sixty-first year.

General Logan was a private in the First Illinois Volunteers. He became quartermaster of his regiment with the rank of first lieutenant.

Since the outbreak of the war he has affiliated with the republican party and his earnest, able advocacy of the distinctive principles which drew him within its ranks has contributed in a measure to the maintenance of its supremacy.

He resigned from the army in August 1865, and was appointed minister to Mexico in November, but declined. He was subsequently elected to the 40th and 41st congress, and was elected to the United States senate in 1871 to succeed Richard Yates, again in 1879 to succeed Governor Oglesby and was again elected in 1885.

His candidacy for vice president on the republican ticket with James G. Blaine in 1884, is still fresh in the memory of all. He was one of the most prominent in the senate and was a fine speaker, and was particularly regarded as the champion of the soldiers.

As inquiries are constantly made concerning the status of the bill to pension soldiers of the Mexican war, it is proper to state that the bill which passed the house last session was amended and passed by the senate and is still in the hands of the conference committee without action.

DELUTH, Dec. 26.—John Bushnell, a watchman at elevator E, died suddenly while on duty last night. He was sitting in the engine room at the time, and but a few minutes before had been telling stories to other employees.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26.—George Brown, a bar tender from Sacramento at 409 Pacific street, was brought to the receiving hospital at 1:45 this morning suffering from three knife wounds in the region of the heart.
