Prevention of Diphtheria.

Diphtheria is a dreadful disease at any time, especially does it become so when it breaks out in a family of children or in a school. It is both dangerous and contagious. The germ are as ily carried in clothes, from one person to another. Probably the best disinfectant is sulphur. Besides preventing the spread of diphthéria, sulphur has a salutory effect on those already afflicted. Great care should be taken in schools. No children should be allowed to attend from families where the disease already exists. The school room should be fumigated every day after school hours. In families where two or three are afflicted at the same time, they should be isolated and confined in one Roll of honor—among those who may be mentioned as deserving praise for earnest work are the following: Those who made an average standing of over 90 in all studies are, in the Academy. Roy bed room, and all the children not afigated with sulpher two or three times daily. An easy way of fumigating is to drop a pinch of sulpher on a hot stove, or if a stove is lacking, a few coals on a shovel will answer the purpose. A little experience will determine the amount of sulpher needed for each room. not necessary to fill the room with smoke to suffocation. If the fumes are offensive the windows can be raised for a minute or two.
