Natural gas was struck on the premises of ex-President Hayes at Fremont, Ohio, last week.

The Illinois legislature has defeated the bill submitting to the people the right to vote upon the prohibitory amendment.

Secretary Dan. has sailed for Europe, hoping the tonic of sea air would benefit his health. Ex-Treasurer Jordan went along to look after him.

"Not in his right head" is the testimony of the witnesses in the Goldenson case. Evidently they have been well trained in what they should say.

Five more Chicago officials have been arrested on indictments charging them with conspiracy to defraud, and the embezzlement of the county funds.

The Republican state convention of Rhode Island met Wednesday and nominated by acclamation all the present incumbents of state officers, from governor down, for the party candidates.

From every bear cellar and div throughout this land, where congress the communists, socialists, and anarchists, come cries of joy over the attempted assassination of the Czar of Russia. Bah! is there no way we can get rid of these fellows?

An attempt was made last Sunday to assassinate the Czar of Russia but without success. The affair has created great excitement throughout Europe. The London Standard commenting on the matter says: "Such an event might be sufficient to turn the scale in the direction of war. From this point of view the outrage is of the greatest possible significance."

The secretary of the treasury has issued a circular designating San Francisco as a port from which imported merchandise may be shipped in bond transit through the United States to and from the British possessions of North America by such routes and under such regulations as the secretary of the treasury may prescribe.

It is reported that the resignation of William C. Endicott as secretary of war is in the hands of the president. While this is probably premature, the fact is there is very little sympathy between the president and Endicott, and an entire alienation may occur any time. Endicott, it is asserted, finds his duties in the cabinet not congenial. The president is disappointed in Endicott as a political factor, and he has been a complete failure in an official capacity.

The naval department is about to begin preparation of plans for two 1,700 ton gunboats for which provision was made by the last congress. Inasmuch as these boats will be patterned after the gunboat now in the process of construction, the work of the department will be much lighter than if gunboats of a new design had been ordered, as it will only be necessary to duplicate the drawings already made. The limit of the contract price of the new vessels is \$550,000 each.

The workmen of the east are fast becoming disgusted with the Knights of Labor organization. The strike of coopers in New York has just ended, and the men have returned to work after signing an agreement to sever their connection with the Knights of Labor and all other labor organizations with which they are connected. In the preamble to the agreement the men say: "Having been persuaded to become connected with the organization known as the Knights of Labor, and through that connection having been ordered to leave our steady employment for something which in no manner interests us, the results of which has caused suffering to ourselves, our wives and families, we pledge ourselves to leave such associations."

It does look now as though some of the European nations really did mean business, and that war it likely to be declared at any time. Speaking of the situation in Austria and Germany a correspondent, who has just arrived in London from Carcow, says: Ten thousand men are engaged night and day in fortifying that place. Austria's preparations for war are herculean, but a little late. Germany, on the other hand, is prepared to start on a campaign tomorrow. All the army contracts are signed, and officers have their sealed marching orders. The expectation of an immediate war is almost universal. Her state of readiness is perfect, with not a gaiter or button wanting in the equipment of the army. Business is completely suspended, and commercial relations have been so much disturbed that opinion favors an immediate release from the tension in Germany. Notwithstanding rumors of probable violation of Belgian territory, the feeling is that a campaign can be conducted as in 1870, on the Alsace-Lorraine frontier. France will not be so ready for war as Germany will be. It is thoroughly understood that if war breaks out in the west of Europe it will be begun by Germany for tactical and diplomatic reasons, so as to neutralize France in the event of an Austro-Russian conflict.

NOTES AND NEWS.

Canada yesterday added another vessel to its navy, a fast schooner of 195 tons. This will be the terror of the fishing waters and no American will dare approach her.

It is rumored that Dr. Parker, of London, Rev. Henry Ward Beecher's intimate friend in that country, will be asked to succeed him in Plymouth church. Dr. Parker is a man of the Beecher type and is certainly the most popular preacher in London. He is very dramatic in style and is very advanced and liberal.

Dispatches from London dated the 15th, report that a remarkable darkness enveloped London at noon that day. It was dark as midnight in the vicinity of Charing Cross, Whitehall and the Strand, the atmosphere being pitchy dark. The eastern and southwest portions of the city were somewhat clearer. Snow fell heavily for a time.

About four o'clock Saturday, the three year-old daughter of Wm. Smith, who lives on Long Tom, about fourteen miles south of Corvallis, was fatally burned by her clothes igniting from the fire-place. Her mother was out at the time and the hired men hearing the child's screams, ran to the house and found her horribly burned about the body and head. She lived until 11 o'clock that night when she expired.

Kieman's New York News Agency prints the following on the attempt to extend the Northern Pacific from Astoria to Portland: It will be opposed by the Oregon & Transcontinental, and some trouble will be encountered in getting to work. If the Northern Pacific directors can make satisfactory arrangements, the constructing of the roads will be pushed through, despite the opposition of the Transcontinental people.

Four boys at Randolph, Rich county, Utah, went out fishing on the 9th inst. and found an old double-barreled shotgun in a deserted cabin. The boys began snapping caps on the gun. Finally Alexander Livingston took the weapon to the door and put on a cap and it went off just as Frank Pearce came in range. The little fellow, who is 12 years old, received the charge in the right side and expired almost immediately. The coroner's jury found a verdict of accidental death.

A horrible railroad accident occurred Monday morning on the Dedham branch of the Boston and Providence railroad, between Forest Hill and Rosindale, at what is known as Bussey park bridge. The 7 o'clock train from Dedham, consisting of seven cars and a baggage car, under the charge of Conductor Tilden, broke through the bridge. The engine and three cars went over safely but five others fell through the bridge to the road beneath, a distance of thirty feet. The last car, which was the smoker, turned completely over and struck on top of the others, all being crushed almost out of shape. The cause of the accident is said to have been the breaking of the bridge. Thirty-seven persons were killed and eighty injured. Among these are many women. Conductor Tilden was among the killed.
