The steamer City of Peking with 1,100 Chinese passengers, arrived in San Francisco Monday, with smallpox on board. She was immediately quarantined.

E. W. James, convicted of involuntary manslaughter by killing Mrs. Julia A. Newton at Albina a few weeks ago, was given a one year sentence by Judge Stearns on Saturday. It is thought the governor will pardon James.

Rev. J. R. N. Bell of Roseburg, editor of the Roseburg Review, has been appointed clerk of the railroad commission. Mr. Bell will still retain the ownership of his paper, but will place it in charge of some one, while he attends the duties of his office.

The secretary of the interior has requested the secretary of war to place the western portion of Indian territory, including Oklahoma, under the jurisdiction and control of a single army officer, with instructions to exercise extra vigilance in the matter of preventing an invasion of the territory by the boomers during the coming spring and summer.

Murphy, the bias ribbon temperance orator, says: "you can regulate—prohibit largely by heavy license—but you can't prohibit by law. I do not believe so much in legislative enactments and parties accomplishing the thing we would all like to see and would be the better for, as I do in what the world is doing for itself quietly but grandly and inexorably."

The returns from the election held in the state of Michigan Monday shows that the prohibition amendment has been defeated by 5000 majority. The people of Michigan have tried prohibition once and the remembrance of it is still fresh in their minds. From 1850 to 1862 Michigan had most stringent prohibitory laws, but they were so distasteful to the majority of citizens that it was impossible to enforce them, and they were repealed.

The Prohibitionists of West Fairview, Pa., were knocked silly Wednesday, by their wives sending this petition to the court of sessions: We, the undersigned ladies, all of full age, residing in West Fairview, Cumberland county, respectfully represent that we believe that a licensed hotel is necessary in our town, and we feel sure if license is granted, and our husbands can obtain and drink liquor when desired, they will not bring home such large quantities as now, nor go away to Harrisburg for liquor and remain from home.

Gen. Logan's new book on "Volunteer Soldiers of the Union" will soon be issued, and it promises to create a sensation. The aim of the author seems to have been to elevate the volunteer soldier of the republic in the last war at the expense of the regulars. West Point military academy is handled with great severity, and the social military lobby of which it is boldly charged that during and since the war, legislation of congress was influenced against volunteers and in favor of the regular is denounced in terms of the severest reproach.

Tankerville Chamberlayne, owner of the yacht Arrow, which holds the Queen's cup, has replied to Gen. Paine, owner of the Mayflower, which has challenged him for the cup. One condition demanded is that the Mayflower shall fasten her center-board down so as to draw as much water at all times as the Arrow, which is a cutter. A letter containing this demand was posted last Saturday, and General Paine is requested to cable his reply. With center-board chained down, the Mayflower, in our opinion, can still hold the lead. Assistant Secretary Thompson said yesterday that he could not disclose the reason why the Treasury Department refused to confirm the appointment of Wm. H. Watkins as Deputy Collector at Colville, W. T. As yet the name of the new applicant has not been read. The Treasury Department is engaged in the investigation of serious charges against a recent appointee to an import-office in Washington Territory. It is understood the gentleman under investigation was appointed from Oregon. The matter is being looked into at the request and suggestion of the President.

Judge Noah Davis, the eminent jurist, on joining a republican club in New York the week, made a speech in which after referring to the suppression of the negro vote in the South, he said: "But the great crying evil is not that. In this country the evil of the liquor saloon is becoming so terrible that it will conquer the country or the republican party must conquer it. In a recent conversation with Senator Everts I was pleased to find that he had reached the same conclusion, and he will so express himself publicly when occasion offers. I don't stand here to preach prohibition, but to say to the republican party they shall do what is practicable to crush out the saloon, which is the nursery of the democratic party."

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

Spokane Falls, April 5.—This city was thrown into considerable excitement today by the reported capsizing of the steamer Spokane a boat owned by Nelson Martin, plying between Coeur d'Alene and Kingston. It was the first trip of the steamer, and the accident occurred on the Coeur d'Alene river, only about a mile below Kingston, at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon. The current of the river, which is now very high, is rapid, and the craft ran into a drift at the head of a small island, swung around and capsized. Five men were drowned as far as known, and it is thought one or two others are missing. Those who are lost whose names are known are: J. C. Hanna, of this city; N. J. Higgins, a capitalist of Bangor, Maine; Lorenzo Pike, of Portland, and Ed. Jerome, of Lewiston, Idaho. A survivor of the accident states that nothing could be done to save any of the men who were lost. The steamboat was taken completely under a drift. The captain and engineer were arrested, but set at liberty on their own recognizance. A party of men are making every effort to recover the bodies, but those acquainted with the locality consider the search useless. Mr. Hanna was an old resident of this city, and leaves a wife and family.

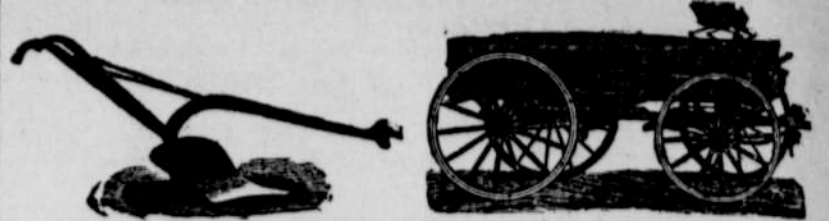
