MARPLE WILL RANG.

The Murderer of Corker will Suffer the Extreme Penalty of the law, June 29.

The trial of Marple for the murder of Judge Hurley began the closing argument for prosecution by calling the atof which they had been called upon to and drew a graphic picture of the dis ery of the murdered man, and the ghastly wounds which had caused his death. He spoke of the manner in which Marple first came into the town in the night any slept in a barn; of his having inquired if Corker slept alone in the store Fresh roasted peanuts at H. H. and the expression used by Marple, that "it would be easy to get away with him," and of his having told Corker that some one could come in there crawl over the partition and beat his brains

> In short, the address of Judge Hurley was a masterly review of the entire situ-ation. He closed by saying if the jury fathed to convict Marple the murderer of Corles Corker would never be punished, but would walk forth from this court free, to be a curse on the community, as he had heretotore been.

At one o'clock p. m. Judge Boise charged the jury. The question for them to decide was whether the prisoner had done the deed or not. The zear displayed by the citizens in endeavoring to ascertain the facts in the case was ter the jury was to disregard speculation and regard facts. It was pecessary to determine from circumstances who had done the deed, and it was for them to lecide whether the circumstances were sufficient to convince them beyond ; reasonable doubt; that the defendan

ad committed it. He explained clearly the difference between positive and circumstantial evidence, and as to what evidence was competent. It was competent to show that defendent knew about the premise and where Corker kept his money, and where he slept. Explained the differ ent degrees of murder, and instructed the july as to different verdicts that might be rendered. He spoke of the necessity for the law being administered impartially, and how an agreement could be arrived at by the jury, and spoke of the desirability of an agreement spoke of the desirability of an agreement being arrived at, so that the scandai might not go abroad that a jury could not agree and justice could not be ad-ministered. The fate of the prisoner was committed to them, and all they had to do was to do their duty frankly and conscientiously. At 1:30 p. m. the jury retired to deliberate upon their verdict.

At 9 o'clock p. m. the jury brought in a verdict or "guilty as charged in the indictment." At the request of the court the prisoner stood up while the verdict was read to him. He did not show the least sign of concern, and sat down apparently the least affected of any of the large crowd that had gathered in the court room to hear the verdict

At 11 o'clock on Saturday the prisone was brought into the court to receive his sentence. He walked quietly into the court room between Sheriff Harris and his deputy and took his seat before the judge. He seemed as cool and collected as on the previous evening, when he learned the result of the verdict and did not show half the excitement that time of judgment."

He told the judge in a laughing manner that this would probably be the last time he would ever have a chance to talk and hoped those present would hear with him a little while. He spoke of the manner in which he had acted at the uneral of the murdered man, and said he was not ashamed of it, and said he was affected because he thought some dle word of his spoken at a thoughtless time might have led other parties to commit the dastardly deed. He said that he had shot at the Chinaman and said that he was in such a place that "by gracious, I had to shoot there was no getting around it, I had to shoot, here a ripple of laughter went round in which the prisoner joined heartily. How long he would have consinued in this strain cannot be told, but his counel, by consent of the court stopped him Marple turned to the judge and told him that he was about to sentence an inno cent man, and that some day he would ow and regret it. The prisoner then folded his arms and awaited his sentence. The judge said he had no op tion in the matter the jury had found him guilty and it only devolved upon

himself to pronounce sentence.

Judge Boise then said "It is the sen from hence, and confined in the county jai until the 29th day of June, 1887, and upon said day between the hours of 10 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p. m. you be taken from said jail to the place o'execution and in accordance with this judge-ment, you be hanged by the neck until you are dead, and may God have mercy
