A. B. Singleton, the detective, is after the \$500 reward offered for the arrest and conviction of D. I. Corker at Lafayette. —Portland News.

If we remember aright, D. I. Corker, was killed last November.

The commission of Eugene Semple as Governor of Washington territory has arrived. The new official will leave for Olympia on Friday and it is expected that he will assume the duties of his office on Saturday, April 23.

Bids for the site of the federal buildings at Los Angeles were opened Tuesday. Four were received varying from \$1 to \$100,000. Colonel Foster, who has the matter in hand, is not satisfied with the result, and will re-advertise for bids.

The Tacoma News (Democrat) says: "Everybody will rejoice with the news at Mr. Blaine's recovery. We do not admire Mr. Blaine's politics, but we have profound respect for his brains. Men of his ability are handy to have around."

The inter-state commerce commission appointed Edward A. Moseley, of Boston, to be secretary of the commission. Moseley was taken for one of the commissioners, and is a democrat member of the Massachusetts legislature. His business is that of a lumber merchant, and he has special acquaintance with the general subject of transportation.

The Chicago Times reiterates the statement made by a prominent importer some days ago to the effect that if the Inter-State commerce commission refuses to suspend the long and short haul clause for transcontinental lines, the Canadian Pacific will put on a steamboat line between Chicago and Point Arthur for the purpose of competing for all classes of Pacific coast freights. Their tariff will be 40 to 50 per cent. lower than American roads.

Newton McConnell, just appointed chief justice of Montana, has long been known in Tennessee as an ardent prohibitionist. He has been on the state circuit bench for ten years, owing his election largely to this trait. He was active in enforcing the law which forbade opening a saloon within four miles of any school house in towns not incorporated. Some that were gave up their charters on his persuasion so as to come under the four-mile law.

An investigation has been ordered into the firing upon an American vessel off Beaver harbor, N. B., recently, by the Canadian cruiser Vigilant. The dominion government is very reticent about giving any information regarding the case, which, by some well known authorities on international law, is considered a serious matter. It would appear from the evidence in possession of the public, as related by the crew of the Vigilant, that there was no proof of the strange vessel being a fishing vessel.

A new labor movement which advocates a more sensible way of adjusting difficulties between employer and employee, than by strikes, has been started in New England, which will somewhat weaken the Knights of Labor. It organizes among the boot and shoe makers. It aims to adjust troubles by arbitration instead of strikes. The leaders have been organized for some time and this society mainly includes cutters. The executive committee are arranging to form branches in every shoe making town in New England.

A special to the Evening Wisconsin says: "Company E, eleventh infantry, stationed at Fort Sully, received orders to proceed at once to the Winnebago and Crow reservation and drive settlers from the lands. Orders are reported to be strict, calling for the destruction of property if necessary. The greatest excitement exists, and it would not be surprising to see a miniature Riel rebellion inaugurated on these lands. This territory was thrown open by the Arthur administration in February, 1884, and thousands of settlers from all parts of the United States rushed in and took possession of the claims. Cleveland's revocation of Arthur's proclamation has brought on the present crisis.

NOTES AND NEWS.

The Sunday Mercury comes to us this week in a brand new dress, and greatly improved in typographical appearance.

David Kirkpatrick, an old resident of Albany, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head with a revolver, Monday last.

The common council of Bowenmonth England, at which place Ex-Secretary Manning is sojourning, has adopted resolutions welcoming him and expressing best wishes for his speedy recovery.

Some anxiety is felt regarding the brig North Star, that left Seattle on March 27, bound to San Diego with a full cargo. She left about the same time as the St. Stephen, and was probably in the same gale in which that ship foundered.

Samuel L. Carter of Salem, was arrested Tuesday morning by Officer Minto, who found him acting in an unusual manner. He desired to obtain a revolver for the purpose of shooting some imaginary enemy. He was taken before Judge Shaw and examined by Drs. Carpenter and Wade, who pronounced him insane. He was taken to the asylum.

Work on the new steel cruiser Charleston, at the Union Iron works San Francisco, is progressing as rapidly as possible. The patterns for the stern posts to be cast by the Pacific rolling mills, have been completed. The work is progressing on the pattern for the nose piece for the ram. This will be cast steel. It will probably be a month yet before the keel will be laid.

Relative to the indictment found by the United States grand jury at Portland because of the alleged frauds in swamp lands in Oregon, Commissioner Sparks, of the general land office, said that new developments have recently been made and the department is endeavoring to break up what he termed a ring of robbers. Sparks added: "I think, too, we shall have some of them in harness before long."

The old case of Wells, Fargo & Co. vs. the Northern Pacific railroad company came up in the United States circuit court, Monday, in Portland, presumably for the last time. Judge Deady made an order dismissing the bill and discharging the reference to assess damages. The suit was brought for the purpose of fixing the amount due the railroad for carrying Wells, Fargo & Co.'s business before they wound it up along the N. P. road. An amicable settlement has at last been reached without the aid of the courts and presumably cheaper than it otherwise would have been.

TRUE HEROISM.

The Atlantic express train going east on the New York Central due at St. Johnsville, N. Y. at midnight, was wrecked by a land slide at Fly Creek, several miles west of there. The train was fifteen minutes late and running at a high rate of speed when it dashed into the debris. The track on the south side is close to the river, and when the train struck the mass of earth, the engine and tender left the track and rolled over into the river. Engineer Edward Kenner of Albany, was killed, and Eugene Wylie, fireman, was badly scalded and had a leg broken. The train consisted of nine coaches, and all but one left the track. The passengers were badly shaken up and some of them slightly injured. The express car did not leave the track but the next two cars were thrown from the track into the river, and the fourth car was thrown on its side down an embankment. The engineer and fireman went down with the engine. The engineer was panned fast in the wreck and was badly scalded. He was conscious for a few minutes only and directed that train No. 3, of the St. Louis express from the east be flagged to prevent further accidents. This was done, and what might have been a greater calamity was averted. Kenner died in half an hour with his wife's name on his lips.

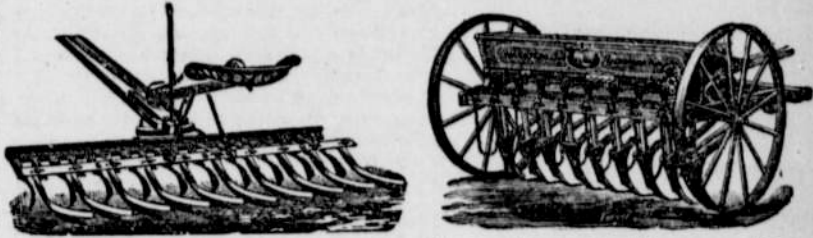
