The minutes of the meetings of April 5th, and 12th, were read and approved. The committee appointed to confer with J. C. Cooper in reference to opening a street through his property, as petitioned for by J. W. Cows and others reported that they had investigated the matter and recommended that said petition be not granted. On motion said report was adopted.

Ordinance No. 53, to improve and regulate licenses, and regulate the manner of issuing licenses, was introduced and passed.  
 Ordinance No. 54 to provide for the prevention and removal of nuisances and punish those who allow or maintain them, was introduced and failed to pass.

The marshals and recorders reports for the month of April, were read and placed on file.  
 The following bills were allowed, viz: E. C. Brooks, tending fire engine, \$12.00; G. W. Kaufman, marshal fees, \$25.50; Rogers & Todd, stationery, \$1.45.  
 On motion the council adjourned to Thursday evening May 5, 1887.
