Forest fires of an extensive and damaging character have been raging in Michigan. The outlook for a similar affliction in Oregon has not been at all threatening this spring.

Grand Master Powderly does a sensible and patriotic thing when he advises the Knights of Labor to celebrate the 4th of July, and to use only the stars and stripes in their processions.

President Cleveland has prohibited the sale of liquor on the grounds during the national drill next week. Now look out for another war on the subject of interfering with "personal liberty."

The Key West Board of Health has officially announced the appearance of a case of yellow fever. The patient is a carpenter and has been there since last December. The city is full of strangers, and an early exodus is expected.

The president issued an order changing and consolidating a number of internal revenue districts throughout the country. The State of Nevada is consolidated with the Fourth district of California, and the Territory of Utah added to the district of Montana.

The county printing of Klickitat county, W. T., was let recently to the Golden-dale Sentinel for nothing per square first insertion, and half of that sum each subsequent insertion. The Tribune's bid was 1 cent, and 1/2 cent per square, all of which goes to show that all a newspaper in the country wants is glory.

Tacoma is going to jubilate over the entrance of the Northern Pacific into its gates, and the News, in calling upon the city to advertise the event, says: "The management should open their mouths so wide that the citizens of Spokane Falls can look down their esteemed throats and see what they have for breakfast."

Last Thursday an explosion of nitroglycerine took place at Spirit Lake, eight miles from Duluth, Wisconsin, in Dwyer's emery factory. Eight thousand three hundred pounds of explosive were stored in the wooden building. There is now a hole one hundred by sixty feet and forty feet deep, where the building stood. It is not known whether any lives were lost.

Commissioner Sparks has a brothe who, last week in an insane fit sat down upon a railroad track which runs near his house on purpose to be run over by the passing train. It so happened that the engineer saw him in time to save running over him. Had it been the commissioner many poor settlers upon government land would have objected to the stopping of the train.

A newspaper or an editor who discharges his duties faithfully need not expect that all his readers will applaud his work—some will cuss him this week and those who do not will cuss him next. His only course is to go ahead and say what he believes. He ought to be sure and believe something, for in this age people abhor men without opinion.—Galveston News.

The Canadian Pacific having asked permission to carry goods in bond from San Francisco to Port Moody, the secretary of the treasury has approved, the bond and sent instructions to the custom officers at San Francisco to permit the execution of the usual bond. This will give a competing transcontinental route not subject to the restriction of the inter-state law.

A Kansas exchange announces the death of three members of a family, caused by eating pork contaminated by trichina. It has been claimed for years that rats first introduced the terrible trichina in swine and then through fresh pork into human bodies. Dr. Landrey supports this theory with personal observations and cites a number of cases showing that dead rats, mice and cats should be kept away from hogs.

Bill Nye, the Western humorist, is a tall, lank, smooth-faced, bald-headed snigger, who wears glasses. He began his career as a writer in Wyoming, where he was first heard of as the editor, proprietor and manager of a paper called the Boomerang. He had at first tried his hand at mining, and in the course of his experiences became possessed of a rule which he called Boomerang. When he dropped into journalism he honored his faithful, long-earred partner by confiding his name on the paper. At least that is what Bill says. His name is Edgar William Nye, and he is one of the most domestic men in the country.

Assistant General Manager Buckley has been authorized to proceed at once to build a new steamship wharf and warehouse for the Northern Pacific railroad company. The warehouse will be 300 feet long and 80 feet wide, to be located immediately north of the present bonded warehouse. The plans are made and work will begin as soon as bids for material and work are approved. This wharf and warehouse, with that of the local company, will give Tacoma 1300 feet of new wharfage this season. The warehouse on the latter company's dock is to be 40x160 feet, giving the needed room to handle the anticipated shipment of grain from the inland empire.

Wilcox, of Hood River, writes to a friend in this city that he would like to undertake to illuminate Mount Hood on the evening of the Fourth of July, under the auspices of the Portland celebration committee. He is willing to make the attempt, provided the committee furnishes the material. If he fails he wants nothing; if he succeeds he wants good pay. Mr. Wilcox is a mountain climber from "way back," and knows what he is about.

Sad was the scene that occurred last Saturday at this city. Mrs. Benker, the wife of an honest laborer at Sorensen's logging camp, with five children, had come to town to do some trading. When about to depart for home a boat containing the lifeless body of the husband and father, pulled up to the wharf. While in the act of felling a tree, a limb fell and struck him on the head, crushing it in and causing death in a short time. The body was buried Sunday afternoon. Tongue cannot tell the anguish thus suddenly forced upon this unfortunate family, who had left their town in life well and hearty. They have the warmest sympathy of this community.—Astoria Transcript.
