The president has accepted two sections aggregating thirty-four miles of the Cascade branch on the Northern Pacific railway in Washington territory.

The New York hop market still continues very firm and Pacific coast varieties are in demand at good prices. The eastern crop will be slim this year and raisers in Oregon and Washington will get good prices for their products.

Powder manufacturers of this coast, owing to the fact that sulphur, nitre and the other ingredients of which powder is composed, can be furnished to them here, cheaper than they can be furnished to firms in the east, can supply eastern consumers with powder cheaper than the firms of the east can do.

Messrs. Burke, Dekum and Ladd have been empowered by the Pioneers' association to make arrangements for an excursion of the members to the east similar to the one had four years since. The committee will confer with the railroads in order to secure as favorable rates as possible. Quite a number have signified their intention of participating in this excursion.

A. L. Blake, late deputy collector of customs of Port Townsend, died at the county hospital in Chicago Sunday morning. Mr. Blake it will be remembered, was on his way east to Washington when suddenly taken ill, but was not, as first reported, insane. He burst a blood vessel in his brain, from which he died as above stated. The remains will be taken to San Francisco for interment there.

Dr. G. H. Davis, of Champoz, the man who figured in a breach of promise case in East Portland some months ago is under arrest, awaiting the action of the grand jury now in session at Salem, charged with ruining a girl at Champoz and then attempting a criminal operation. The girl is not expected to live. Dr. Davis was arraigned before Justice O'Donald for a preliminary examination and the case was continued until July 5.

The flag topic at Washington is not altogether exhausted. A movement is on foot to require the war department to provide better quarters for the flags and to have them opened to the inspection of the public, as the law directed. If the war department refuses to do this when congress meets a resolution will be offered in the senate, to investigate the reason why. The law is clear on this point, but at present it is necessary for any one wishing to inspect the flags to first get a written permit signed by the secretary of war.

The fact of the hostile Apaches showing up or committing any fresh depredations causes many to believe they have found their way back to their reservation, and are being kept in hiding by their people. No definite report of their whereabouts has been received since they were seen a week ago crossing the San Pedro river, near Redding, and heading for San Carlos. They were then on foot, and as no horses have been reported stolen in the neighborhood since that time, it is presumed they have made their way back to the reservation on foot.

Last week Peter Troy of New York was arrested as he stepped off the steamer Adriatic at Queenstown, for having explosives in his possession. He is an American and the English mutton-heads thought that he was going to blow up Queen Victoria on her jubilee day. It now turns out that the mysterious box that caused his arrest and was the means of alarming Queen Victoria was nothing but a box of fireworks which Troy was taking to a little American friend in county Tipperary who was anxious to give vent to his patriotism on the 4th of July. All New York is laughing at the great joke.

The several parties sent out by the Mexican Government to inquire into the truth of the volcanoes believed to be in active eruption in the Sierra Madros have reported. That portion of the commission investigating in the neighborhood of Bavispe and Bacerae failed to find an eruptive volcano, but instead they found an immense chasm 23 miles in length with an average width of from 15 to 20 feet. This great rift runs along the back of what is apparently the most solid portion of this gigantic range. Many other apertures of less dimensions were also found, some of them even reaching down and into cultured fields below.

Work will shortly be commenced on a road extending from Astoria, Oregon to Forest Grove, a distance of 110 miles. The line will connect with the Oregon & California branch of the Southern Pacific railroad. By means of this road, connections can be maintained with the eastern routes, and as the builders of the road intend to erect sheds and wharves, deep-water ships will be able to load at Astoria. Rails to the line are expected shortly from England. Locomotives and rolling stock are being constructed in the East. The cost of the road and equipment is about one million dollars, the entire sum has been subscribed.

**THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE.**

LONDON, June 22.—The Queen rose early this morning and took a drive in the garden at Buckingham Palace. Subsequently Her Majesty received a few guests and then visited the Duchess of Cambridge. In the afternoon she received the homage of foreign Princes and others, and also the presents sent in commemoration of her jubilee.

Among the dresses of the peeresses yesterday that of the Duchess of Bedford was notable for softness and grandeur of color. It was of royal purple velvet trimmed with antique Malines lace. The Duchess of Manchester wore a dress of white and gold moire' worked with gold thread and grey silk in arabesque design. The Duchess of Roxburg wore a train of black broche gauze over white silk draped with black lace. The Duchess of Sutherland and her daughter wore robes of broad striped satin and moire, draped with jet gauze. The dresses of the ladies in waiting generally outshone those of the royal personages present.

A reception and banquet was given at the palace last night, the guests being limited to members of the royal families and Diplomats. Minister Phelps was present.

British embassies in all European cities were illuminated in honor of the jubilee. At Madrid the Infanta Isabel and Spanish ministers, diplomats and statesmen attended a reception at the British embassy. Queen Christiana wired congratulations to Queen Victoria. Dispatches from all parts of the world show that wherever there were Englishmen the day was appropriately celebrated. Thousands of children are marching to Hyde Park to attend a young people's fete to be held there today as a sort of a jubilee aftermath.

Wednesday morning Judge Boise sentenced W. Wirt Saunders, to the penitentiary for the balance of his life. Saunders was very much broken up when he had to take leave of Sheriff Minto and be conveyed to the penitentiary.

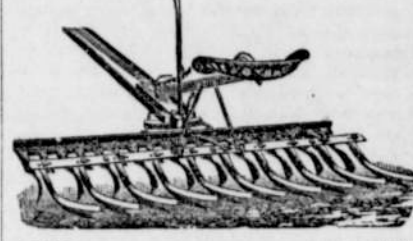

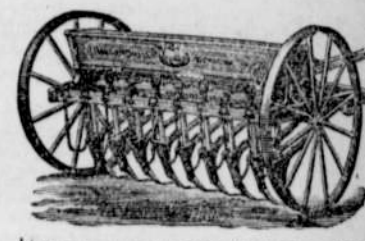
