O. M. Kelty the wife murderer was forcibly taken from jail Wednesday night by a masked mob of forty men and hung to an oak tree in the court house yard. An entrance was made by cutting off the hinges of the door leading to his cell. While the mob were forcing an entrance to the jail, Kelty attempted to take his life with a piece of broken lamp, and made several bad cuts on his throat before the mob reached him. It is whispered about this city that men in this town knew about the affair, that Kelty was to be lynched on Wednesday night. We will not vouch for the truth of this report.

NORTH YAMHILL. The celebration at North Yamhill was a complete success as far as management, good time, attendance, hospitality, music, etc., went.
