The state election which came off in Kentucky August 1st resulted in a democratic victory. The returns at this writing are incomplete although enough is known to insure the election of the entire democratic state ticket by 40,000 majority. The legislature will be largely democratic in both branches. Ex-congressman Phil. B. Thompson appears to be beaten for the legislature. This result was unexpected, and it is considered rather significant in respect to local politics in the state. The democracy stood on a sound and wise platform and was lead by a gallant ticket and the result is the usual old fashioned democratic majority. It cannot be claimed that the Kentucky election has any special bearing on national politics, as the state is one of the most reliable for the democracy in the Union. The Kentucky democracy strongly endorsed the present democratic administration in its platform, and have voted that endorsement by a superb vote.

A prisoner confined in the penitentiary, says the Walla Walla Union, named A. Williams, has had a strange career. Thirty-nine years of age, he has served twenty-four years of that time in various reformatory institutions—seventeen years of the time being spent in the Oregon state prison at Salem. A man of great natural abilities, the temptations to commit crime when free are to strong, and his lease of liberty is always short. Several years ago while confined in the Oregon pen, having but three days to serve, the state fair being held he escaped, stole a suit of clothes, a horse and other valuables and skipped out, but was recaptured in a few hours and received an additional sentence of five years.

A report is generally circulated and generally believed on this coast that the Chicago and Northwestern that is now constructed nearly to the center of Wyoming Territory, was connected at Boise City with the Oregon Pacific, is authoritatively denied. Mr. Stanwood, the local agent in San Francisco of the Northwestern, asserted positively that the company has not any plans beyond the terminus at Fort Caspar. The line was extended recently to that point from Fort Fetterman only to secure extensive coal deposits at Fort Caspar. The fact that John J. Blair and Percy Pyne of the Northwestern and also directors in the Northern Pacific, was probably the origin of the report that the two lines would connect.

Mr. Smeaton, director of agriculture of the northwest provinces of India, has issued a note on competition between India and American wheat. He says that India possesses means to compel America to withdraw her hostile tariffs and open her markets to British industry, but is burdened by higher freight charges, excessive handling and apparently (though not really) inferior quality. He advises London merchants to use their influence with the railways.

The Morning Oregonian and the Times Mountaineer, of The Dalles, are having a rather wordy discussion on the "through and back rates." Both are very able in their arguments. The Oregonian is in favor of the scheme, and the Dalles paper is on the kick. No telling how it will end. Scott is liable to be in with the Mountaineer next issue. He is very facile, if a person should judge from his editorials.

Additional advices from Millbrook, Kansas, which was struck by a cyclone Thursday evening are to the effect that the place was practically demolished, seventy-nine buildings including hotels, school house, churches and residences, being wholly or nearly destroyed. Losses foot up \$63,000. The people are in great distress, and a committee has been appointed to solicit aid.

A postoffice has been established at Cole's valley, Douglas county, with J. L. Churchill as postmaster.

Texas has gone against the prohibition amendment to the tune of 55,000 majority.

Last Monday the Northern Pacific railroad began excavation for a fine headquarters building in Tacoma. The structure will cost between eighty-five and one hundred thousand dollars.

Anthony Noltner, editor of the Portland World, has been appointed weigher and gauger at the Portland custom house. The appointment is a good one and well earned by Mr. Noltner's long and faithful party service. May he hold it until he is promoted.

In the case of Wells, Fargo & Co. against the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company, Judge Ross in the circuit court, waived a finding in accordance with the judgement, that is, he orders the defendants to pay for 4,340 sacks of wheat at the rate of \$1.58, and also orders the payment of \$650 costs.

Suit has been instituted by A. J. Grant against Victor Guerrero, John B. Fitch et al, for a tract of land which covers nearly two-thirds of the area of San Francisco county. The suit is based upon an old Spanish land grant, which Grant claims was made to some of his progenitors in very early days.

The annual report of license collector O'Brien for the year ending June 30th has been filed with the supervisors of collections, and gives an account showing of the sources of revenue from which the city of San Francisco draws full half a million annually. This year's collections are larger than ordinarily, and embrace \$478,050.10 and of this amount \$475,697.50 was paid into the city treasury, and \$4,349.60 into the state treasury.

Lying within this city is a piece of property and business which, if the right man should get, he could in the course of time, build up a business that would be an honor to Yamhill county. This is the foundry, which is lying idle and decaying. If this business should be started and a success made of it, it is capital added to this town. Why not some one take hold of it in connection with his blacksmith shop, and in the course of time make a large manufacturing establishment out of it?

A thing that is needed in this town and something which will not cost much money, and at the same time be a help and save considerable bother and inquiry; is the name of the street on every corner. The name could be painted upon a board and nailed to every corner house or fence. It would not cost more than \$20. at the outside, for painting, boards, and putting up. It would improve the looks of the town and inspire a stranger with the energetic and city like look of the town. The business men advertise their place of business as being upon such a street, especially for the benefit of strangers, who, upon their advent in the town have to inquire the name of the street. All this bother can be obviated by placing before their eyes the name of the street in plain black and white.

Surrounding us is the best wheat section in Oregon. McMinnville is the most central point in the whole wheat section and in our mind the future distributing point. It is to a certain extent the "Hub" of Yamhill. You can go to any other town in Yamhill and you will not see as much business transacted in a week as there is here in a day. But then a little common sense look at the situation will not hurt matters. As McMinnville has the necessary wheat growing country around it; why not have a flour mill with facilities for grinding all this beautiful wheat into flour? This is a question. Why not? As far as financial returns are considered the investment would pay certainly 25 per cent. If Lafayette can furnish all the flour for McMinnville and county, besides shipping large quantities out of the county, why could not this place do the same. A mill that could turn out 1000 barrels of flour a day could easily be supplied with the necessary grain. By this establishment a large amount of money would remain in the town. The farmers would sell to the mill, the mill would sell to the outside consumers, and the money paid the mill would be so much more capital for McMinnville. There is a good chance in our mind for a speculation and we hope some sharp business man will improve the opportunity offered.

It is reported that gold has been discovered at Black river Junction about ten miles from Seattle, by three men who claim to be old miners from California. There is considerable excitement there. A number of people visited the place last Sunday, and thirty or forty claims were staked out and posted. The finders claim to have had rock assayed, and that it assays from \$16 to \$40 per ton and \$4 in silver. Color was found on Jorgensen's farm. Three adjoining farms are now overrun with prospectors. A party of miners started a tunnel Monday morning. A placer mine was also discovered a day or two ago on Vashon island, and a claim has been filed with officials here and work commenced.
