LEVY A TAX.

There is much wailing and nashing of teeth when a city tax is talked about. Levy a tax by all means. Let the city council show progress, enterprise, and grit if they have it and levy a tax upon the property in this city, to be devoted entirely toward improving it. For the last seven years this city has been entirely supported by the saloons and a few illiterate peddlers and patent medicine venders. If a person selling some flashy jewelry would come to town he would get a string full of suckers, as the tooth pullers did, and these same suckers will plunge up to a fraud all the coin they have in their clothes, knowing they are being beaten out of it. The same men will make a great cry about a tax of two or three dollars per year for the improvement of the city. RESIGNATION.

Gov. Swineford is very likely to resign the Chief Magistracy of Alaska within a few days. Since going to Alaska, too, he has dabbled in mining properties, which have panned out rich, and he says it would be to his advantage to give his exclusive time to the mines. We need a system of laws so as to insure titles to occupants. Unless I am satisfied that congress will recognize Alaska's wants, I will tender my resignation before I leave here." The prospects for the legislation which the Governor wants are not bright, and his resignation may result within a week or so. In this event Michigan would undoubtedly name his successor.

MAKING BIG GUNS.

The casting of the big gun at Pittsburg on Wednesday ought to be the beginning of the development of a new industry for which the United States has special facilities. It is not alone that we need the means for providing our ships and forts with the best of modern artillery, although this is a work which will tax the best foundries we can make for many years. We want to be ready to repel hostilities although we do not expect them; and when once it is known that we are prepared the danger of foreign attack will be greatly diminished, and it is pretty small already. But when once American capital and skill have built up an American Essen we shall make the big guns, as well as the machine guns, for the whole world. At present the Krupp works have substantially a monopoly. But when the American works are prepared to turn out the same class of goods the great European powers will naturally prefer to make their purchases here. A continental war would not then cut off their supplies of ordnance, nor would Italy, Austria, Russia or Spain be compelled to purchase big guns from a nation against whom they might want to use them. This "biggest steel gun" of ours, now cooling off at Pittsburg, is a very small baby. When completed it will weigh only five and a half tons. The big guns of Europe weigh 125 tons. But now that we are started we shall grow very rapidly.

THE LICK TELESCOPE.

The announcement that the Lick telescope on Mount Hamilton, in California, is finished and in working order is the most important news which has greeted the astronomical world in a number of years. The process of construction has been slow, tedious, and many unexpected obstacles have had to be overcome. It was eleven years ago last October that the will of James Lick was opened and found to contain a bequest for the erection of an astronomical observatory which was to contain the largest telescope in the world. This provision was a surprise, as Mr. Lick had never made any pretension to scholarship or shown special interest in scientific subjects. The contest of his will, the need of using the utmost care in selecting a proper site for the observatory, and the necessarily slow process of construction have occupied nearly a dozen years. Mount Hamilton, the location chosen for the Lick Observatory, is about 60 miles southeast of San Francisco and is the highest elevation in Santa Clara county, it consists of two peaks connected by a ridge, one of which is 4,582 and the other 4,442 feet above the sea level. The lower peak was chosen as the best site for astronomical observations, and on it has been erected a structure equipped with every appurtenance necessary to scan the heavens successfully. The building consists of two domes, one of which contains the great telescope and the other a 12-inch equatorial. The telescope, which is a refracting one and the largest in the world, is 56 feet 6 inches long, and 4 feet in diameter at the center, tapering to 38 inches at each end. The object lens is 36 inches in diameter, being 3 inches wider than Sturte's telescope at Poulhava, Russia, the next largest in existence. With so splendidly equipped an observatory and an instrument the most powerful of any yet constructed and placed in a location especially adapted for sidereal and planetary observations, astronomers may justly anticipate important additions to their knowledge of the heavenly bodies. It is a long step from the modest instrument which Galileo put together in 1610, and with which made discoveries which immortalized his name to this magnificent instrument which sits on Mount Hamilton. The intervening 277 years have been filled with achievements of men whose skill and enthusiasm have mapped out the heavens and revealed unknown facts to the eye of man. Whether there yet remain discoveries to be made by the Lick telescope which will place the name of some American astronomer beside those of Sir William Herschel and Lord Rosse, the future can only reveal.—Philadelphia Press.

ANTI-VACCINATION.

The success of the anti-vaccinationists is aptly shown by the results in Zurich, Switzerland, where, for a number of years, until 1883, a compulsory vaccination law obtained, and small-pox was wholly prevented—not a single case occurred in 1882. The result was seized upon in the following year by the anti-vaccinationists, and used against the necessity for any such law, and it seems they had sufficient influence to cause its repeal. The death returns for that year (1883) showed that for 1,000 deaths 2 were caused by small-pox; in 1884, there were 3; in 1885, 17; and in the first quarter of 1886, 85.
