We have just had some refreshing
showers but the sun now shines again.

The Nestucca Beekeepers Association
hold regular monthly meetings in this
way, with pleasure and profit to all
concerned. Many questions of im-
portance relating to the business are
discussed quite frequently among the mem-
bers, and beekeepers too. They make
a large amount of honey, (the bees I
mean, not the beekeepers), and the hon-
ey is of the best quality. We hope to
see every farmer have a hundred stands
of bees; there is too much honey in
these hills and valleys going to waste
that might well be saved; and it
would be a source of considerable in-
come.

The city of Woods is enjoying greater
prosperity now, under the present na-
tional democratic administration, than

The Traveller.

OSWEGO, April 10, 1888.

Ed. TELEPHONE.—Arrived at this
place direct from McMinnville last
evening at half past six. Roads in places
in very bad condition. Have, hereto-
fore, had a good opinion of the friends but
a piece of road in their settlement has
shaken it out a little. Said piece of road
would shake one's faith in the past, pres-
ent and future. Am surprised that such
good people will leave a place so pro-
vocative of profanity unattended to.

Another addition to Newberg has been
lately laid out at the railroad station
where lots will be actually given away
to those who will build and occupy busi-
ness houses on them. They have struck
the right key and purpose to make a
town. Other places in Yamhill had
better "look alive" or while they
wait, they will be taken over by New-
berg's will mature and raise a goodly
brood. While putting away my horse
last evening who should grasp my hand
but Will Hurst, formerly of our town.
He is at the head of the carpenters on
the pipe foundry here—a small build-
ing covering as much ground as is
embraced in one of our blocks. The
main structure is 75 feet wide 223
ft. long and 77 ft. high with wings and
towers of various sizes of which I could
not find out. The smelting works are a vast
improvement over the old ones. Briefly
described they are an iron stack 160
ft. high, three stories as I believe they
are called, 70 ft. high also of iron and
tiles, the size of a fire brick, and a tall
chimney. This stack and stove are 1 sup-
pose for heating the air before it is
forced into the furnace proper. Then
there is the boiler room and engine
room. The boilers, four in number,
are 40 feet long and 6 feet in diam-
eter. The engine cylinder is 36 in. x 6 ft.—
I measured with my cane. A Worthing-
ton pump to feed the boilers as high as
any engine in McMinnville. But a trou-
ble I heard you. There are only about
two hundred men employed here as near
as I can find out. Doubtless they
know their business better than I, but
it looks to me like if they expect to
make the pipe for the Portland Water
Co. by June then will have to increase
their working force very materially. An
accident at the quarry occurred yesterday
afternoon wherein a man got his foot
caught in a fire falling rock and a car-
riage. How seriously I could not learn.

A 12 or 13 year old son of a Mr. Man-
dison, yesterday stole a box of gun-
powder caps from the chest of one of the
workmen at the dam and in experi-
menting with them spoiled his fighting
hand. Moral: boys don't monkey with
gun powder. Good drinking water is
scarce here but an equilibrium is main-
tained by the aqueduct being very abun-
dant. Well! I exhaust you beyond hope of
recovery I subscribe myself,
