COUNTY DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Things Moved Along Without A Hitch And A Good Solid Ticket Nominated.

The untitled assembled in goodly numbers at the court house in Lafayette Wednesday and elected a ticket which will make a good showing at the polls in June.

The convention was called to order by J. D. Ferguson of Lafayette at 10:15. Fenton of McMinnville moved that gateway of McMinnville be elected temporary chairman, carried; Sparks of McMinnville moved that L. Thompson act as assistant temporary secretary, carried; L. F. Hall of West Chehalis moved that a committee on permanent organization and order of business be appointed by the chair, consisting of one from each precinct, carried; J. L. Ferguson of Lafayette moved that a committee of three be appointed on credentials, carried; chair appointed the following persons to act on committees.

Permanent organization and order of business. L. F. Hall, West Chehalis; John Demery, North Yamhill; N. K. Sifton, Carlton; W. D. Fenton, North McMinnville; W. C. Hembree, South McMinnville; R. N. Snell, Dayton; John Haney, Lafayette; Frank Wright, Bellevue; H. S. Maloney, Sheridan; Clay Burch, Amity; M. B. Hendrix, Wheatland; R. Everest, East Chehalis; R. Booth, Willamina; J. M. Ramsey, Dundee.

Committee on credentials. J. L. Ferguson, Lafayette; Willis Star, Dayton; John W. Bridwell, Amity.

Motion made by Ferguson that convention take a recess until 11:30 for committee work, carried. Convention called to order at 11:30 o'clock; committee on permanent organization and order of business reported as follows: To the democratic county convention of Yamhill county, Oregon, Gentlemen: We your committee upon permanent organization and order of business respectfully recommend as follows: 1st. That the temporary officers of this convention be declared the permanent officers thereof. 2d. That the convention proceed to nominate by ballot, candidates for the following offices, in the order named to-wit:

The nomination of two representatives, " " of a county clerk, " " of a county recorder, " " of a county sheriff, " " of two commissioners, " " of a county treasurer, " " of an assessor, " " of a county school superintendent.

The nomination of a county surveyor, " " of a coroner. And your committee further recommend that it requires a majority of all the votes cast in the convention to nominate any candidate. Respectfully submitted. L. F. HALL, Chairman.

On motion the convention adjourned until 1 o'clock. AFTERNOON SESSION. Convention called to order by chairman at 1 o'clock. Chair appointed as tellers, R. N. Snell of Dayton, C. Grissen of McMinnville, and C. C. Ferguson of West Chehalis.

A collection was then taken and a goodly number of checks were dropped into the hat for campaign purposes. Hon. W. T. Newcomb of Tillamook county was invited to a seat within the bar, on motion of Fenton. In a little speech to the convention Mr. Newcomb stated that the county endorsed the nomination of C. V. Kuykendall.

The following resolution was then read and adopted, with an amendment made by W. T. Newcomb of Tillamook: WHEREAS, The delegates from the counties of Yamhill and Tillamook, to the Democratic state convention as joint representatives for the counties of Yamhill and Tillamook our esteemed fellow-citizen, C. V. Kuykendall; therefore be it Resolved, That the democratic party of Yamhill and Tillamook counties, by W. T. Newcomb, chairman of Tillamook central committee, in convention assembled, do hereby ratify and confirm said nomination of Mr. Kuykendall, and pledge to him the united support of the democrats of this county and Tillamook at the coming June election.

The chair proclaimed nominations in order and Fenton in a neat speech to the convention placed in nomination the name of J. C. Nelson of West Chehalis; Mr. Nelson declined. In a speech, into which the county seat figured prominently, Mr. Ferguson claimed the nomination of Mr. Nelson for commissioner. Mr. Fenton in reply to Mr. Ferguson blistered the Lafayette man in good shape. Mr. Ferguson was squelched, but made a kick in which he said no gag law in this convention, on a point of order raised by Mr. Fenton. Mr. Fenton then placed in nomination the name of Geo. W. Bridwell. L. F. Hall of Chehalis placed in nomination the name of E. E. Selph of Sheridan.

1st ballot, Bridwell 75, Selph 40, Nelson 2. Bridwell declared elected. 2d ballot, Selph 107, Hall 8, Gilkey 2, Mondenhall 1, Maloney 1. Selph declared elected. Haney of Lafayette moved that the nomination of the two representatives be declared unanimous. Out of order. Nomination for clerk was then declared in order. Harris of Dayton, Hendrix of Carlton, and Ferguson of West Chehalis were placed in nomination by their respective delegations. 1st ballot, Harris 56, Hendrix 44, Blank 1, Ferguson 18. Ferguson withdrew. 2d ballot, Harris 72, Hendrix 47. Harris declared elected. Nominations for recorder in order. Moved that rules be suspended and Thompson be declared nominated by acclamation. Carried. Nomination for sheriff in order. Ferguson nominated Harris, seconded by Fenton, Burch of Amity and Nelson of Lafayette were placed in nomination by Hurley and Ingie respectively. 1st ballot, Harris 85, Nelson 17, Burch 14, Gee 1, blank 1. Harris declared elected. Nominations for commissioners was declared in order and the following named gentlemen were placed in nomination: J. C. Nelson, West Chehalis, H. Geo. of Bellevue, J. R. Forrest of Wheatland and C. G. Scott of Carlton. 1st ballot, Scott 84, Gee 32, Nelson 44, Forrest 7. No election. 2d ballot, Nelson 50, Scott 53, Gee 13. No election. Mr. Ferguson made a motion to suspend rules and declare Scott and Nelson the nominees. Fenton objected and Ferguson withdrew the motion, remarking that the convention could see the way the wind blew. 3d ballot, Scott 79, Nelson 46, Gee 2, Scott declared elected. Mr. Ferguson then addressed the convention in favor of Mr. Nelson, Mr. Fenton spoke to the convention in favor of Mr. Gee. Mr. Fenton then jumped Mr. Fenton but without apparent success upon the delegation. Mr. Fenton replied and then Mr. Ferguson rose and wanted to know if Mr. Fenton made certain statement. Mr. Fenton remarked that he possibly did in order to tally Mr. Ferguson. Mr. Ferguson retorted with a forced smile upon his face. Very exciting for a few minutes then order was restored and the ballot proceeded. 4th ballot, Gee 63, Nelson 54. Mr. Gee declared elected. Nomination in order for treasurer. The following named gentleman were placed in nomination, S. F. Harding of S. McMinnville, G. Goucher of Amity and J. Dixon of Lafayette. 1st ballot, Goucher 71, Dixon 22, Harding 16. Goucher declared elected. Nomination for assessor being in order the following names were placed in nomination, L. F. Hall of Chehalis, H. E. Ketcher of Dayton, J. C. Nelson of Amity, J. C. Fryer of Carlton, W. Carry of Lafayette, R. Longacre of S. McMinnville, F. Wright of Bellevue. Mr. Ferguson nominated Mr. Harmony, provided he lived west of the railroad. Mr. Fenton, seconded the motion and Mr. Ferguson said it was plain to be seen that Mr. Harmony was a resident of one of the McMinnville precincts. A telegram was read as follows: Dayton, Oregon, May 2, 1888 Hon. Wm. Galloway, chairman Democratic convention, Lafayette, Or. I have just been informed by wire of nomination. Please express to the gentlemen of the convention my earnest thanks for the honor conferred. Hoping that victory may crown our efforts in the county campaign. I am very truly yours, R. L. HARRIS. 1st ballot, Hall 32, Longacre 23, W. Carey 12, balance distributed around amongst the candidates. No election. 2d ballot, Hall 61, Fryer 23, Longacre 6, Wilson 9, Carey 14, Gilson 4, Wright 1, Jack 1. Hall declared elected. Nominations for county school superintendent being in order, the following named gentlemen were nominated, C. C. Linden Willamina, W. F. Williamson of North Yamhill, and Carl Young of Lafayette. 1st ballot, Young 37, Linden 54, Williamson 24. No election. 2d ballot, Linden 58, Young 54, Williamson 2. Linden declared elected. Nominations for county surveyor being in order. Mr. Maloney was nominated. He being the only candidate the rules were suspended and Maloney was declared unanimously elected. Nominations for coroner resulted in T. Rowland of McMinnville and G. H. Smith of Amity being placed before the convention. 1st ballot, Smith 54, Rowland 12, Sawyer 2, Fenton 9, Savage 3, Ferguson 3, Michaux 6, Allen 1, Galloway 11, Goucher 1, Wright 1, Jones 1, Blank 1. Smith declared elected. On motion convention adjourned. PLAIN AS DAY. The county seat fight has not ended yet, as can be seen by the efforts of Messrs. Ferguson and Fenton in the Democratic convention Wednesday. Mr. Ferguson was champion of the Lafayette party in the convention and worked manfully for his cause. It was as plain as day that the majority last November ruled the convention. It is about time for the supporters of Lafayette to drop the fight as their cause is antagonizing the majority of the people. When a cause antagonizes, as this one does its chances grow smaller every time it is agitated.

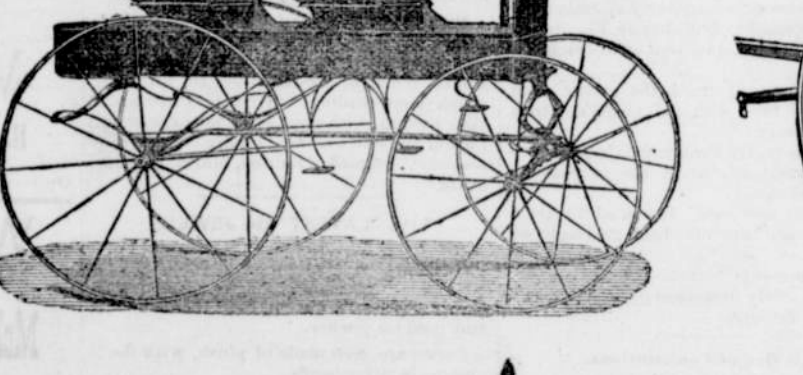

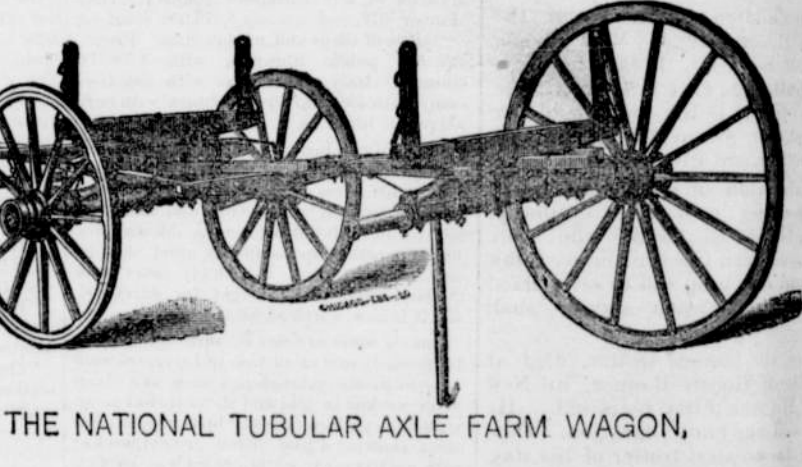

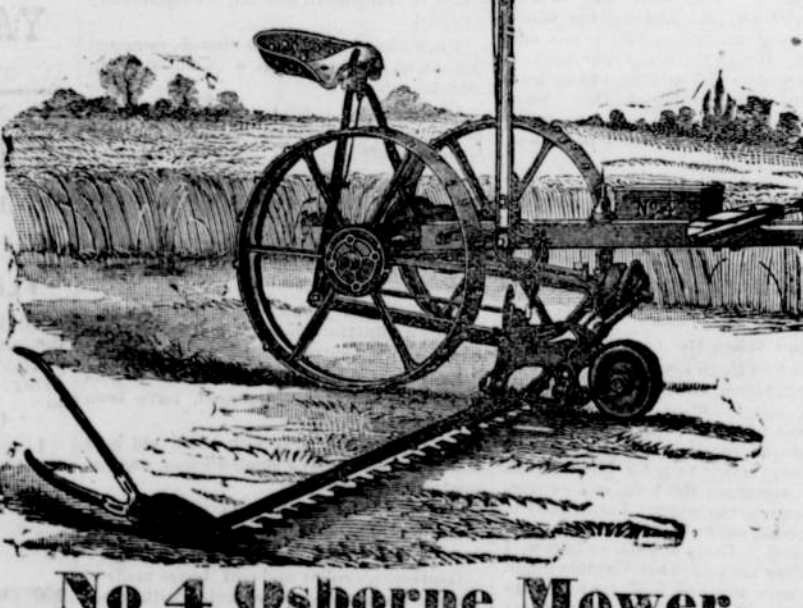

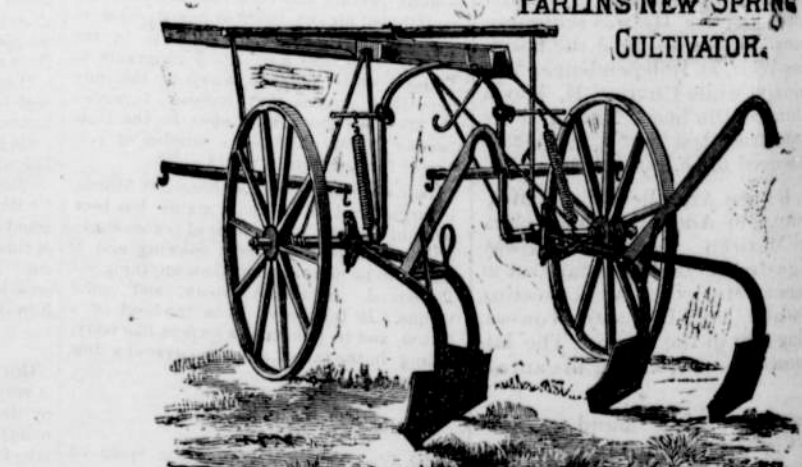
No 4 Osborne Mower.



THE NATIONAL TUBULAR AXLE FARM WAGON.

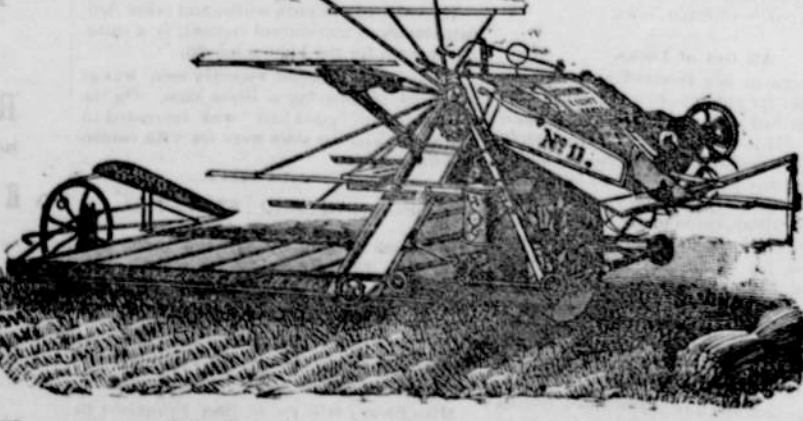


The new Light Steel Frame Osborne Binder.
