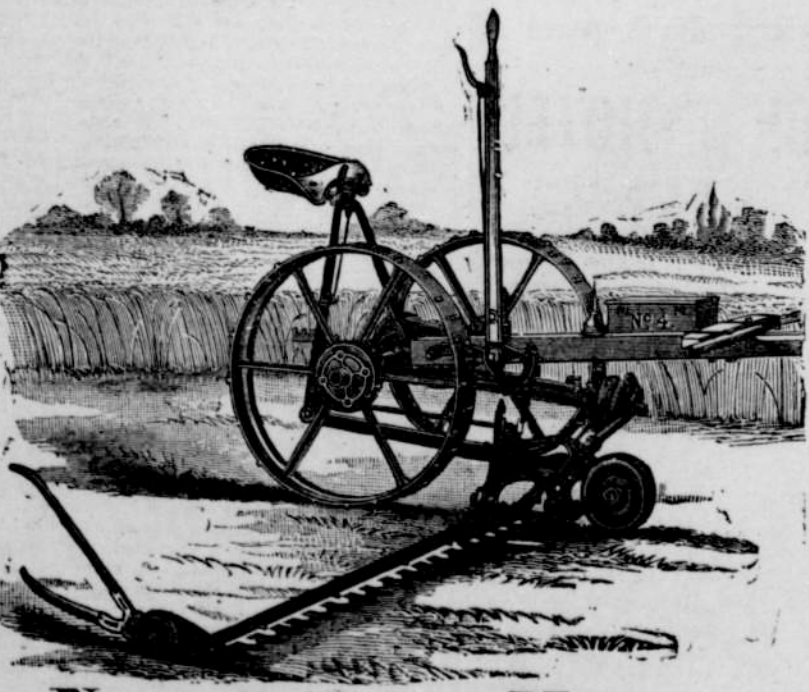
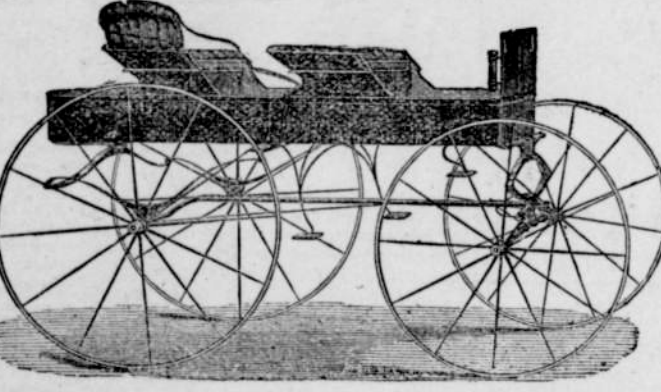
Did it ever occur to the Republican voters of McMinnville that Brutscher will get almost every vote at Lafayette.

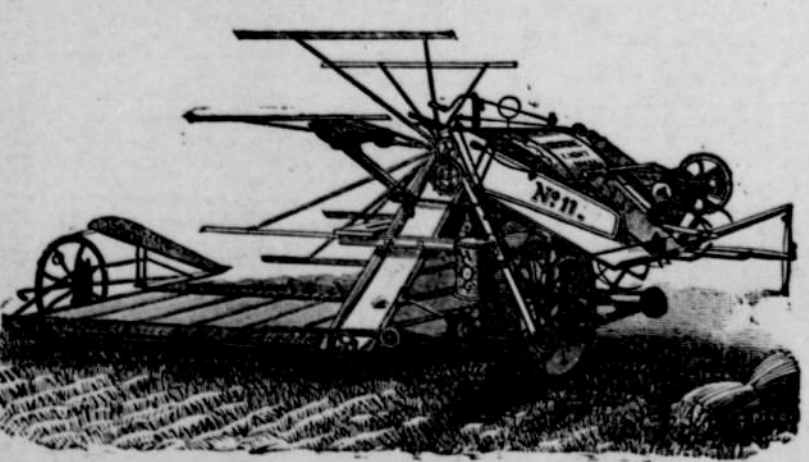

No 4 Osborne Mower.

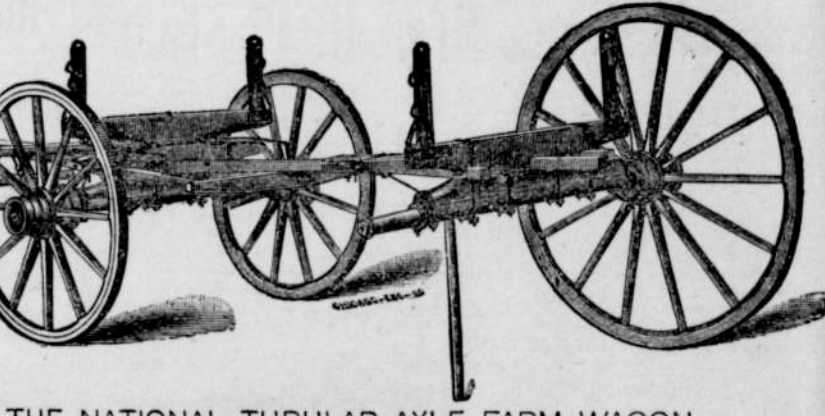


The new Light Steel Frame Osborne Binder.

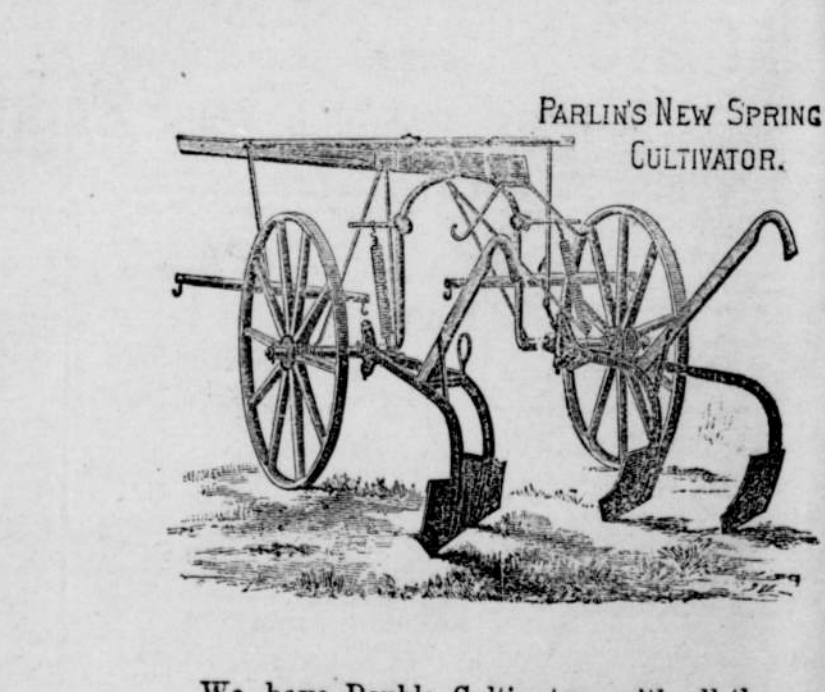

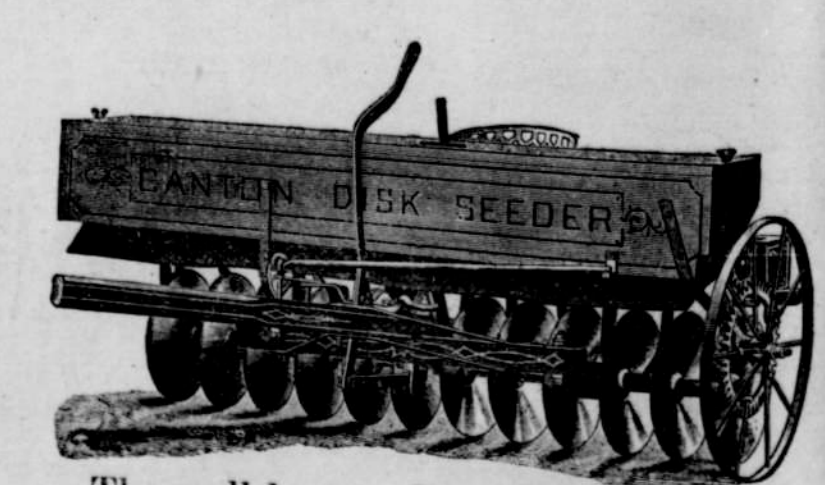


THE NATIONAL TUBULAR AXLE FARM WAGON,
