EFFECT OF COLORS.

A Theory That They Affect the Human Mind as Well as the Human Sight.

There are some curious things in regard to the way in which the human mind is affected by colors as well as the human sight. We are all familiar with what is termed color-blindness, and the unexpected results that sometimes tons marmalade, 22 tons raisins, attend it; but color-sound is something which has received much less investigation.



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
