TOO MUCH FLOPPING

The Examiner Monday had the following editorial: "Oregon is just now attracting more attention than usual. It has been a Republican state at the presidential elections since 1868, but the large majority, which it gave the Republicans in June, was the first ray of comfort the party got this year, and it has led them to expect extraordinary results in November.

There are some peculiar factors in the case. Oregon has for many years enjoyed the advantage of possessing an able tariff reform Republican newspaper. Some of the most vigorous onslaughts ever made on the war tariff appeared in its columns. Before the June election the Oregonian dodged the tariff issue, and put the question to its readers as one between public improvement on one side and strict construction on the other. It argued that as the Republican was the party of lavish expenditures, and as Oregon wanted public improvements at the national expense, therefore the Oregonians should vote the Republican ticket. That the argument had its weight is quite likely. After the June election the Oregonian flopped over completely to the side of war tariff. It took back all it had been saying for years about the mischief of high protection and came out flat footed in the opposite sense. It is hoped by the Republicans that its readers will follow the editor's example and flop likewise.

Perhaps it may be well for them to consider the matter before doing so. There was a good deal of method in the Oregonian's mad argument last June that the citizens of Oregon should vote the Republican ticket because the Republicans were a party of lavish expenditures. The flaw in the argument was that if the Republicans were not in power it would not matter power next year Oregon's vote for the Republican ticket would not give it any irresistible claim on the administration for favor. Of course a Democratic administration would be in favor of spending money to improve navigation of the Columbia; but as after all, politicians are party in power.

Section 1 of the bill is as follows: Chinese laborer who shall at any time heretofore have been, or who may now be about to be a resident within the United States, and who shall have departed or shall depart from it and shall not have returned before the passage of this act to return or remain in the United

Section 2. That no certificate of identity provided for in the fourth used. and fifth sections of this act, to which this is a supplement, shall hereafter be issued, and every certificate heretofore issued in persuance thereof, is hereby declared void and of no effect, and the Chinese laborer claiming admission by virtue thereof shall not be permitted to enter the United States."

The president recommended that congress, by joint resolution or in some other manner, provide that such Chinese laborers as have actually embarked on their return to this country before the passage of this bill may be permitted to land. He also recommends the appropria-tion of the amount named in the rejected treaty to indemnify certain Chinese subjects for damage suffered through violence in remote and comparatively unsettled portions of

our country.

The president's message says: "The experiment of blending social habits and race idiosyncrasies of the Chinese laboring classes with those of the United States, has been proved by the experience of twenty years, and ever since the Burlingame treaty of 1868, to be in every sense unwise, impolitic and injurious to both nations; with a lapse of time necessity for abandonment has grown in force, until those having in charge the governments of the respective countries have resolved to modify and sufficiently abrogate all those features of prior conventional arrangements, which permitted the coming of Chinese laborers to the United States. The homestead, timber-culture, desert-land, and other laws have afforded additional opportunities for the perpetration of frauds which have not been allowed to pass un-

From every quarter the cry of fraud" is heard in connection with disposals of the public domain. So far as fraudulent entries under what are termed settlement laws are concerned, the people of every section have the remedy in their own hands.

The acquirement of title to public land under a fraudulent preemption, homestead, timber-culture, or desert-land entry, is a matter of impossibility unless the transaction be winked at and the perpetrator of the fraud be aided and abetted by persons in the im-mediate neighborhood.

Under nearly all of these laws the entryman is required to publish notice of his intention to make final proof, naming the time when, the place where, and the officer before whom the proof will be submitted. If his entry has been fraudulently initiated, or if he has not complied with the requirements of the statute governing such cases, his neighbors surely know it, and with very little trouble or expense they can either before or on the day of making final proof, enter protest against the issuance of patent on the entry, which will put the government on inquiry, and in nine cases out of ten defeat the attempted fraud. But it seems that the men who are willing to put themselves to a little inconvenience for the public good are very scarce, as few if any protests of this kind are filed for the sole purpose of protecting the public domain from spoliation.
